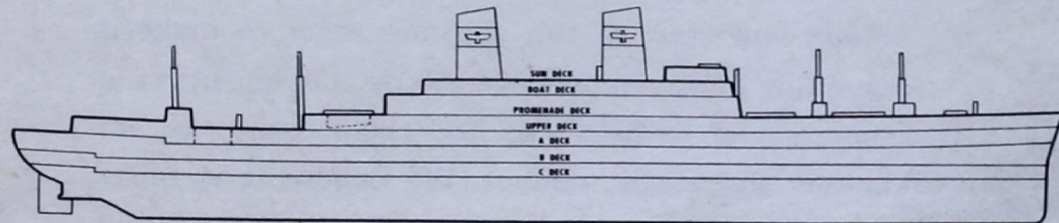

THIS IS YOUR SHIP'S DECK PLAN



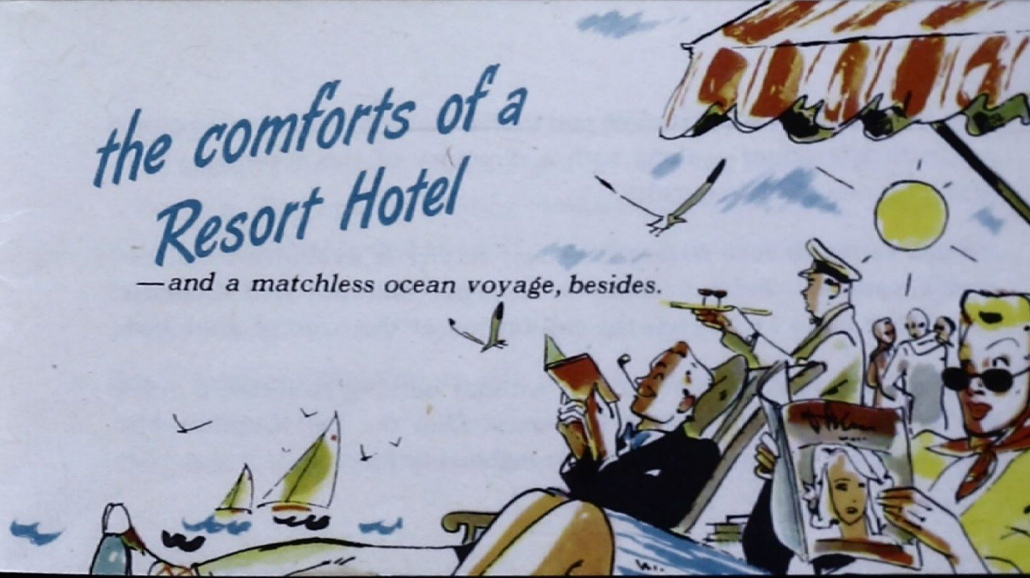

WHAT ABOUT A PHONE? All first class and tourist class staterooms are equipped with telephones — along with a directory of the numbers you'll probably call most frequently.

JUST HOW DO YOU GET ROOM SERVICE? Excellent service is available to all except stowaways. From 7 a. m. to 11 p. m., dial the Bell Captain. From 11 p. m. to 7 a. m., use the call button at the head of your bed.

WHERE TO TAKE A BATH: If your room is without bathing facilities, a quick dip in the Pacific will not be necessary. Dial the Bell Captain who will make far more comfortable arrangements for you.

HOW TO GET YOUR LAUNDRY DONE. Tell your Room Steward whenever you want laundry collected. You'll find a laundry bag and charges in your stateroom. Any articles needing "special handling, please," should be called to the attention of the Second Steward. Suggestion: Last-minute laundry orders are risky, if you're counting on prompt delivery. There is also a small "private" laundry for passengers' use.

NEED A "STITCH IN TIME"? Tailors with needles—valets who know just what to do about soiled wardrobes — are ready to serve you at moderate cost. Ask your Room Steward or bellboy to make the arrangement.

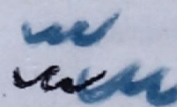
"SHAVE AND HAIRCUT" INDICATED? Then go to the Central A Deck location— or make appointment by phone. Barbers will be found clipping hair all day, from eight until six.

SHAMPOO AND WAVE, MADAM? You'll be pampered to your pleasure at the Beauty Salon, also on Central A Deck. Open all day from eight until six, and you may make your appointment by phone. Gentlemen, there's manicure service for you, too!

WANT A SHOE-SHINE BOY? Leave your shoes outside your door at night— your Room Steward will return them spick-and-span next morning.

Dining news for the inner man

— at any hour



YOU'LL NEED A TABLE, OF COURSE — so see the expert in such matters, the head-waiter, on sailing day. He's located in the Purser's Lobby, on A Deck. Please don't mind if he insists you'll get better service by arriving for meals promptly, as follows:

Breakfast — 8:15 a. m.

Luncheon — 1:00 p. m.

Dinner — 7:00 p. m.

Should you, for one reason or ten, prefer to take your meals in your own stateroom, your Room Steward can make necessary arrangements.

"STARVED"—AND HOURS UNTIL LUNCH? Hot bouillon tastes wonderful, as served by the deck steward at eleven o'clock each morning. Tides you over until luncheon nicely.

TIME FOR TEA? That means it's four o'clock — and you'll find a steaming cup of tea, with delicious snacks, in the Marine Veranda on the Promenade Deck.

HOW ABOUT A COCKTAIL? Order your pet concoction in the Cocktail Lounge or Smoking Room on the Promenade Deck, or in the Marine Veranda — meal times at the Dining Room Bar.



Fun's Fun

to find it.

PUT YOUR NAME ON A DECK CHAIR — for reading, resting or just dreaming. The Deck Steward will see that you get your own private chair and robe — the fee is nominal.

ARE YOU A DECK SPORTS FAN? Try your skill at Deck Tennis, Deck Golf, Horse Races, Shuffle Board and other deck games on either the Sun Deck or the Boat Deck. Never played before? Now's the time to begin!

IF YOU REALLY LIKE DANCING — you'll like the tea and evening dances in the Marine Veranda. Should you be tempted to "sit it out," do remember that this is a vacation and get out on the dance floor anyway.

LET'S GO TO THE SHOW! Catch up on the movies you've missed, by catching those shown every other night in the Marine Veranda. Both main features and travelogues are arranged, to suit your taste.

SWIM ACROSS THE PACIFIC? Well, yes—but the *easy* way, in your ship's two fine pools. Both pools are open from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m., on the Promenade and Upper Decks. There's also a special schedule for children, which the attendant will be happy to explain.

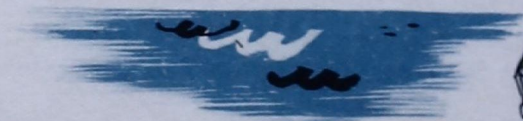
BOOKWORMS, WELCOME! When you've devoured your "bon voyage" books, you'll find a wide selection of current favorites and standard classics in the library on the Promenade Deck. Posted notices will tell you when books can be borrowed, and from whom.

WHERE TO "PARK" THE YOUNGSTERS. There's even a playground, that's no end of entertainment for small fry. Playroom and nursery are under the supervision of a trained attendant, on the Upper Deck. Even a ship's wheel—so youngsters can "steer" the ship.

WANT TO KEEP IN TRIM? Flex your muscles in the ship's gymnasium, on the Upper Deck. Or let an expert do it for you — in the Massage Room, right next door.

CAN YOU USE YOUR CAMERA? By all means make a record of today. Your films are developed promptly at the Photo Shop, located on the Upper Deck. Complete developing, printing, enlarging and special photographic work is done to your order. We have also provided titles for you to splice into your own moving pictures, to add a more authentic touch to your trip.

WHERE SHOULD YOU KEEP VALUABLES? Safe deposit boxes are provided in the Purser's Office, free of charge. While the company assumes no responsibility for loss or damage, we recommend the boxes as superior to a secret spot under your stateroom mattress.

ARE YOU PLAYING SECOND-FIDDLE TO YOUR BAGGAGE? Make way in your room by sending excess luggage to the baggage room. "Visiting hours" will be given you by the Purser. Transfer agents meet the vessel on arrival, to check baggage, about which the Purser can tell you more.

DID YOU FORGET ANYTHING? Descend upon the Novelty Shop in the Main Foyer, Deck A—to complete your supply of toiletries, travel accessories, magazines and tobacco. You'll also want some souvenirs, won't you? There are lots to choose from.

TIRED OF YOUR TRAVEL-TOGS? The dress shop, located on the Promenade Deck, has many a handsome garment, from sun-suits to formals. You're welcome, even if you're "just looking, thanks."

LOST SOMETHING—FOUND ANYTHING? Pass the word along to the Purser.

WILL YOUR PETS ENJOY THE RIDE? While perhaps not as much as in your choice presence, they'll be well cared for in the ship's kennels on the Boat Deck, which are steamheated and well ventilated. You may visit them during specified hours — and you'll appreciate knowing that a special run is provided to keep them from having that "shut-up" feeling.

HOW CAN YOU CONTACT THE REST OF THE WORLD? Putting notes in bottles has gone out of practice! Immediate communication to or from shipboard is provided by the ship's wireless. File messages at the Purser's Office.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO ATTEND CHURCH? Religious services will be conducted on Sundays, by a clergyman if aboard. Requisites for Mass are provided.

WHAT'S THE LATEST NEWS? Your ship's newspaper is published daily, and will keep you informed of all major events, including stock exchange reports.

WEARY OF CARRYING CASH AROUND? Special charge accounts can be arranged after sailing day, through a visit to the Purser's Office.

Is there a doctor in the House?

Certainly — at all times, although we hope you'll never need him. The ship's physician will render such professional services as might be needed, with no fee for illnesses originating on board ship. In emergencies, phone the operator. For regular visits, you will find the doctor located on Central A Deck. Appointments may be made from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m.

Sea Lingo (translated)

AFT. At, toward, or near the stern.

BEAM. Greatest width of a vessel.

BOW. The forward part of a vessel.

BRIDGE. The observation platform or partial deck built across and above a ship's deck for the use of officers in navigating the vessel.

BULKHEAD. Partitions corresponding to walls in a house.

CHART. A sea map used in navigation, showing depth of the sea, location of rocks, and configuration of coast.

CROW'S NEST. A barrel or box on the ship's foremast where the lookout is stationed.

EBB TIDE. The falling tide.

FATHOM. Six feet.

FLOOD TIDE. Rising tide.

FORE-AND-AFT. Lengthwise with the ship.

FORWARD. Toward the bow.

GALLEY. The ship's kitchen.

HATCH. An opening in a deck.

HOLD. The part of a ship below decks reserved for the storage of freight or baggage.

HOUSE FLAG. The pennant usually flown on the mainmast, bearing the emblem of her operators.

KNOT. A unit for expressing a ship's speed. A nautical mile is 6,080 feet.

LEAD. A mass of lead used for taking depth at sea.

LEE OR LEEWARD. The side of the vessel away from the wind.

LOG. An instrument towed by the vessel at the end of a long line recording approximate distance traveled. Also the official daily record of a voyage including weather, wind, direction and velocity, distance traveled.

PORT. The left side of a vessel facing forward.

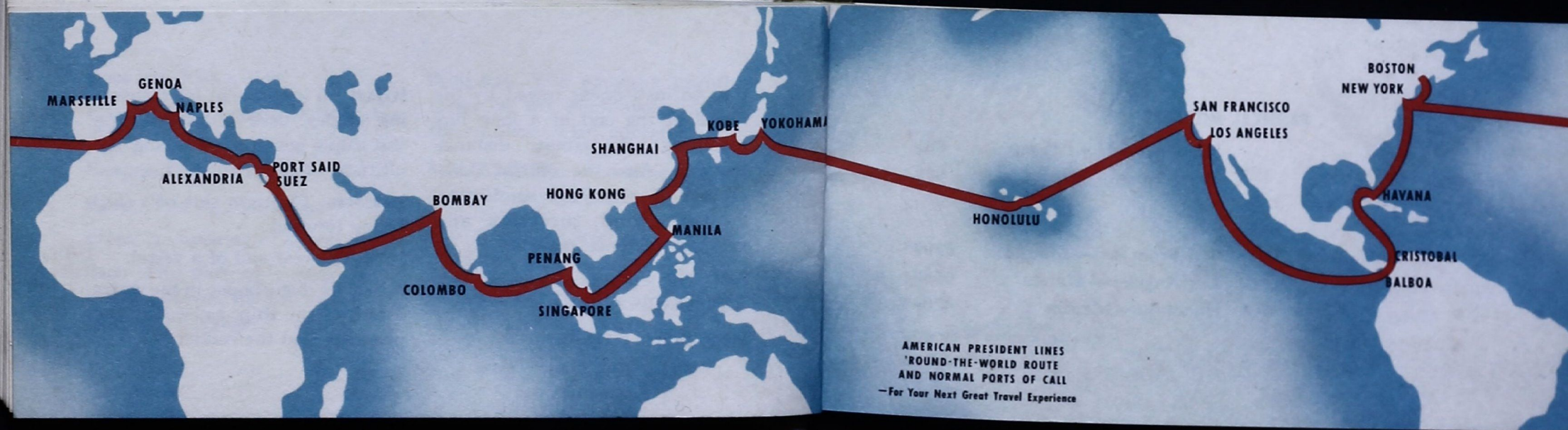
SCREW. Ship's propeller.

SEXTANT. An instrument for measuring angles, used in ascertaining the ship's position by taking the altitude of heavenly bodies.

STARBOARD. The right side of a ship facing forward.

STERN. The rear end of a vessel.

WAKE. The disturbance in the water astern of the ship, caused by the propeller and the rudder.

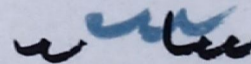

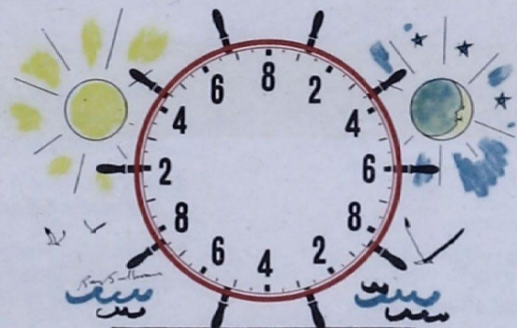
