





SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH

Salt Lake City, the Capitol and metropolis of Utah, is situated in the valley of the Great Salt Lake, from which it derives its name. It is called the "Center of Scenic America" because it is the geographical center of the western region, embracing 62 national parks and monuments.

The elevation of Salt Lake City is 4,354 feet above sea level. Its climate is mild and semi-arid with precipitation averaging about 16 inches. The mean annual temperature is about 57° F.

The present population of the city is in excess of 170,000. It ranks second in literacy among all cities of the United States having a population of 100,000 or more.
