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

Bound within the pages of this annual lie the remembrances of your college days. As you travel down life's highway may this handbook of pictorial memories serve as a stepping stone towards success.






### From the Records







### Dootball 1947

The Pirates started out strong in football by dropping the Sand Point eleven 34-6 in the opening game of the season, with Del Schalock, freshman scatback, pacing the touchdown parade with two trips across the goal line.

Following this win the Whits turned back the Whitman Missionaries, 21-7, to avenge last year's one point defeat at the hands of the Walla Walla team. Bob Cruzen led the Pirates in scoring 15 of his team's points.

Whitworth ran its streak to three straight in turning back the Carroll college Saints, 20-7, with Vern Tucker and Pat Clyde leading the backfield play.

In their first league game, the Pirates matched play with the Eastern Washington Savages, conference champs, for three quarters, but fell behind in the last frame to lose a hard-fought contest, 6-0. Fans remember this game as being played in a severe wind storm which played odd antics with the ball.

The Whits went to Ellensburg to engage in their second league try, but succumbed to the powerful Wildcats by a 13-6 score.

The next gridiron battle was fought in the Pine Bowl with the St. Martin's Rangers. Whitworth was a little over confident in this game. After trailing 12-6 at the half, the Pirates forged ahead 13-12 at the third quarter mark only to have the Rangers come back in the last period to score two touchdowns and go on to win 25-20.

Western Washington dampened Whitworth's homecoming with a 41-0 rout in the Pine Bowl. Playing in a sea of mud, the Pirates couldn't get their speedy backs on the move and they were unable to cope with the powerful Viking line.

With Vern Tucker, Norm Stokke, Bob Cruzen, and Bob Kohlsteadt on the sidelines nursing injuries, the Whits went down to defeat before the North Idaho Loggers in a night game at Lewiston. Final score was 25-7.

In the final game of the season the Pirates made a delayed trip to Tacoma for a duel with the Pacific Lutheran Gladiators. Arriving just in time for the opening gun, the Whits got off to a slow start and lost the battle 27-12. Del Schalock intercepted a Lute pass on the last play of the game and scampered 60 yards to score.

For the second straight year 27 men were awarded letters at the end of the year. With only three players graduating, the Pirates' football prospects for next year indicate a promising season.



### Basketball Team

The Whitworth Pirates basketball team played a full 34-game schedule starting with a 49-45 win over Farragut, November 28, and ending with a 52-48 triumph at the expense of Eastern Washington, February 28.

In Winco league play the Whits won eight games while losing seven. Despite their fourth place finish in the standings, the Pirates proved that even the top team was not too tough as they grabbed at least one victory from each of the other members of the league. Whitworth won three straight from St. Martins and annexed two victories in three meetings with last year's Winco champs—Eastern Washington. The pirates garnered single wins from Central Washington, Western Washington, and Pacific Lutheran, this season's conference titlists.

In non-league encounters the locals drubbed Farragut four times in as many meetings and took two lop-sided wins from Seattle Pacific college. They split a quartet of contests with North Idaho, but lost three successive tilts with Gonzaga. Whitworth was invited to a four team meet in Wenatchee December 19-20. Defeating the strong Portland University five, 68-56, the Whits earned a place in the final play, but lost to Central Washington 55-46 in the deciding game.

Coach Stannard gave out letters to twelve men, nine of them members of last year's squad. With all twelve returning for play next year, the Pirate basketball team can be rated as one of the teams to beat in the coming league competition.









A new club on campus this year, the Flying Club has made remarkable strides towards its goal of training pilots for Christian service.




Contemplation, concentration, and comprehension seem to be the student's mental tools for all of Dr. Hardwick's psychology courses.

The prison epistles as written by Paul while imprisoned in Rome find expression and application to present day living through the studies of this class.




Our future nurses are learning the basic nursing techniques in this course in Introduction to Nursing Care, taught by Miss Thompson.

The "Principles of Economics" class has become the largest in the economics department since its founding. This photo shows but half of the present enrollment.








The students in the physics class enjoy watching someone else work out a problem. At the blackboard, demonstrating how it should be done, is Professor Wilson, head of the physics department.

Dr. Alder's Physiology class examines the corpus delicti of a feline. The class is studying in one of the rooms of the new science building.




The study of the prominent figures in the field of world literature is the purpose of Dr. Christianson's World literature class. Student reports create high student interest in this course.


