Such progress has been stimulated by the interest and encouragement of the succeeding boards of trustees throughout the history of our college.






Foreword

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



JANUARY THAW



Basketball

Despite a poor statistical showing of 10 wins in 31 ball games, the 1949-1950 Pirates fielded a team which was one of the best in recent years. Up against the stiffest competition in the young Evergreen League, the Pirates lost four of their contests by only four points or less. A bucket's difference could have changed the whole picture in several of the games. Six of the losses came at the hands of such formidable opponents as Washington State College, the high-scoring University of Montana, and Montana State College.

Four seniors saw their last regular action for the Whits and all of them had a good year. Bill Roffler, Clyde Matters, and Gordon Brandt placed in that order for scoring honors with the fourth senior, Al Good, just two men more down the line. Roffler tossed in 108 field goals and 123 free-shots for a high total of 339 points. Roffler also scored the most points in any one game for the season with 26 tallies against the University of Montana.






TENNIS



Other important affairs sponsored by the ASWC during the year were the first homecoming parade through downtown Spokane, the annual Snow frolic on Mount Spokane, Campus Day, May Day, as well as the intercollegiate sports program including football, basketball, and baseball.

canvassed the city on April 4 to boost the attendance to the show.

Seven hundred dollars was raised by this initial ticket sale.

The Associated Students of Whitworth college carried on a wide variety of activities during the college year. Perhaps the greatest, surely the biggest, was the campaigning for the proposed Student Union, which is to be named Hardwick Hall in memory of the late Dr. Francis T. Hardwick, who was a prominent member of the faculty from 1929 until his death in 1948. "Varsity Varieties," traditionally a senior money-making event, was sponsored by the seniors as a benefit production. Students

In the fall of 1949 the rally committee was organized as a special part of the ASWC. Gordon Petrequin, chairman, and his student group spurred the school enthusiasm to a new height. Decals and rooter caps were sold to finance expenses. A marching unit—the Pep Cadets—led by Randy Hucks and Pauli Blackwell was introduced at homecoming.

One of the last year's council suggestions—the recommendation for a student court to handle disciplinary problems that concern the entire student body— materialized with the election of the court officials and active operation of the court session. The big issues concerned the speeding and reckless driving on the campus.

As usual the main problems confronting the student council, composed this year of the executive officers, one representative from each campus dormitory and an equal number of representatives from the off-campus organization, Alpha Kappa Chi, concerned the budget and the means of apportioning funds for the various school functions and organizations. The possibility of decreasing the number of campus organizations was the point at issue.




