ROSE WEEK A SUCCESS

When "Rose Week in Spokane" was announced in the bulletin several weeks ago, we prophesied that it would "go big." That this prophesy was advisedly made and has been entirely fulfilled is borne out by the known results of this splendid campaign of which facts the following are a few:

About 75,000 roses were gathered and distributed during the week. These beautiful testimonials of Spokane's sunshine were taken to down town hotels and lodging houses, many of which never breathed rose fragrance before; to sick and invalid women and children; to the poor who had no flowers of their own and to arriving and departing guests upon the principal transcontinental trains entering and leaving the city each day.

Every woman and child passing through the several depots' gates to and from these trains, received a rose. The flowers thus reached travelers from New York and San Francisco, from Chicago and New Orleans, in fact there can be no estimating how far and wide the effect of this brilliant week has reached. Truly this is another big, original Spokane idea. Much credit and praise is due to C. Herbert Moore, who conceived the idea and devoted his entire time for several weeks to its successful carrying out.

We hope to see a recommendation made and passed that "Rose Week in Spokane" becomes an annual affair, each year greater than the past.
