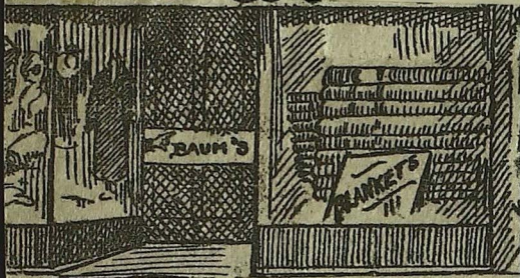

## FATHERS' DAY COMES IN JUNE.

Father is to have his innings now. Mothers' day having been firmly established through the efforts of Miss Anna Jarvis, and universally observed on the second Sunday in May, except when otherwise ordered by Governor Ferris, another woman has come into the limelight by advocating that the third Sunday in June be set aside for the glorification of fathers.

Mrs. John Dodd of Spokane, Wash., is the originator of the "Fathers' Day" idea. As a matter of fact she promulgated the idea two years ago, but only of late has it received general attention and now it bids fair to be as universally recognized as is "Mothers' day."

Fundamentally, both of these ideas are calculated to unite families where the ties have been allowed to become loosened, to draw children back to the home fireside and to induce parents who have become immersed in business or social engagements to find more time to devote to their children. In the case of the mothers a white carnation is the adopted flower. Mrs. Dodd suggests a red rose for the living father, a white one for the dead.
