FATHER'S DAY IS OBSERVED SUNDAY

**RED AND WHITE ROSES TO BE
WORN FOR PARENTS.**

**Idea Originated in Spokane, Wash.,
and Has Been Widely
Adopted.**

Mothers' day and Children's day have passed and Fathers' day is next. It comes tomorrow, June 21, and red and white roses will appear on corsages and coat lapels to do honor to father, as for mother the white carnation is worn.

In 1901 Mrs. John Bruce Dodd of Spokane, Wash., inaugurated Fathers' day and the Spokane Y. M. C. A. gave it formal endorsement. Since then it has become nationally observed. The observance of the day is very simple. It consists in the wearing of a rose, white or colored, in father's honor. Mrs. Dodd has proposed that a colored rose be worn for a living father and a white one for the dead.
