## Letters to and from Hazel Todd (1931) (Part 2)

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Huling, Xiangsi, Aug 22, 1921

Dear Alice:-

This is a very foggy day the coolest since we came up here. Most of the day we have been wearing sweaters. It was the same yesterday but the sun was shining down in the valley. It is lovely up here however it will seem good to be back in Changteh. From here it takes a day or two to reach Hankow. And they tell me to be back there by the fifteenth of next month. It takes about four days going back from Hankow to Changteh. As there is some fighting between we may find that part of the journey difficult.

It is finally settled that Miss Chaffee and I are not to look after the horse, colt and goat. They are dead. That happened since the Drafting came up here for their summer vacation. One reason we did not want to look after them was because we were afraid something like this would happen.

Thank you for the letter about your graduation. You must have looked fine in the different colored dresses. Was the organza in your dress already tucked or did the piece you sent happen to be tucked?

These days I am just as lazy as can be. But this week I am going to ice a birthday cake and if that turns out well I am going to have a chance to ice a real wedding cake. I try to study several hours each day also and perhaps walk an hour or more each day. But once in a while one is called on to do the most peculiar things. Mr. Quick was right when he said that a missionary needs to know a little of everything.

Today a letter came from Mrs. Bannan. They are having a fine time up there on the sea shore. She said the children were getting so tanned. However that would be becoming to them according to my opinion as they were to pale. The baby is five months old today and she said that she has her first tooth.

Do you remember Chester Rutledge? Perhaps Isabelle would remember both he and his wife. They are on their way out to help Dr. Kellar in his work. So there may be a chance for me to see them again. It is possible some parts of the year to go from Changteh to Changsha by launch in one day's time.

Also do you remember the time we went to Visalia together when I was working in the cannery in Epter. Miss Mable Cutler was one of those there that day. She came out to China for a short time and then went back I do not know why. But she is coming back again in the fall. Miss Humphreys who was with her then and she has now been an osteopathic doctor in Shanghai about four years.

As to my sending you your linen ware you must remember your

older sister is a missionary. However you might like a piece right now so I will send you one piece for graduation present and probably Christmas present combined. As you are not using lunch cloths it is for another purpose.

Miss Chaffee is back from the hospital and is getting much better. She gained four pounds the first eight days after coming back. However she may not be able to go back to Changteh in September.

Aug. 24. A letter came from Mother again today and I will try to answer it soon. There is a stack of letters on hand for me to answer. I am afraid to count them for I am sure there must be over twenty. This is not a very good place to get letters written. One came this morning with things to sign for five dollars I must sign for the second this week. This is unusual of course. But I was so enthusiastic about the gate-keeper's daughter they probably think I should pay her tuition this year. Also if Miss Chaffee does not go back to Changteh in September I am going to have to pay for the whole time of the other daughter for teacher. This is the twenty-fifth and a letter came this morning from the Mr. Keller and contained a twenty-five dollar check from the Baptist church. I may use that to pay my teacher. She has had two years of Bible training so when she is not helping me with the language she can go out visiting with me and do a lot of other such things in connection with the work there in the church. We do want to keep her and ever since I met her somehow my heart has been set on employing her as a my own personal helper in taking meetings and in visiting and teaching for she really is well trained. That check would enough to keep her for eight months. You see we do not pay Chinese helpers very much. When Miss Chaffee and I go to housekeeping we expect to pay them each six dollars a month Mexican money and they will be supposed to pay their food out of that. Just now one dollar home money is not quite two dollars Mexican. This may be telling takes out of school. Tell the folks I will try to get their letters answered soon.
