Will Fullerton Remember "The
Old Man" Next Sunday? It
is Father's Day

Father is to have his just recognition again, Sunday, June 21, being Fathers' day. On that day the ministers of Fullerton and other places are expected to take special notice of the occasion and make appropriate reference to the fact. Mrs. John Bruce Dodd of Spokane, Wash., is said to have the distinction of having originated Fathers' day and suggesting that a red rose be worn in honor of the fathers who are living and a white one in memory of those who have passed away.

Whether or not Mayor Gregory of Fullerton will name Sunday as Father's day here has not been announced but it would not be a bad idea—give old dad a chance; he should be honored in Fullerton and all parts of the civilized country.

A dispatch from Taft states that 300 women have written to Mayor Harry Hopkins of that city, criticising his proclamation that sets aside June 21 as Father's day in Taft. Why should fathers have a day, they inquire, any more than uncles or cousins or maiden aunts? Some of the letters are said to be extremely emphatic, accusing the mayor of Taft of trying to create new license for the men folks.

At first Mayor Hopkins ordered a new supply of official stationery and prepared to answer each woman, at length, but letters came in such numbers that he has decided to remain quiet. He stands firm, in his proclamation of Father's day, and the women have been shown a friendly

once to build the group of buildings forming the Poly High, of which the people are so proud.
