**THINKS MEAGHER
WAS NOT KILLED**

**Spokane Man Says General
Fell From Boat and Was
Drowned in River.**

E. A. Kenney, 1818 Gardner avenue, knew General Thomas Francis Meagher, one time governor of Montana, whose mysterious death in the Missouri river at Fort Benton was supposed to have been explained by a confession of a prisoner in Montana this week. Mr. Kenney served in the civil war in the same brigade that Kenney's regiment fought with, and places no credence in the theory that Meagher was murdered.

"After being made governor of Montana territory," Mr. Kenney said, "Meagher and his staff went to attend a banquet on board a boat at Fort Benton. He went out on the deck to get some air. In the darkness he must have walked off the planking and drowned. Nobody killed him. That fellow that confessed to having pushed him off the dock was just a liar who wanted notoriety."

**WEALTHY CLUBMAN
IS UNDER ARREST**

**Found With Girl Who Is
Dying From Bullet—May
Be Suicide.**

LOS ANGELES, May 30.—Fred E. Kolb, a wealthy young clubman, was arrested tonight in connection with the shooting late today of Miss Irene Noble, 22 years old. It was stated tonight that Miss Noble was fatally injured.

Kolb is a son of the late C. C. Kolb, millionaire brick and tile manufacturer, and inherited a large portion of his father's fortune.

The shooting occurred at the home of George Noble, brother of the woman. Returning from his work late today Noble, according to his statement to the police, found his sister unconscious on the floor with Kolb at the telephone trying to summon a physician. When taken to a hospital, a letter dropped from the clothing of Miss Noble, revealing what the police believe to have been a suicide threat made by her. The letter was in the handwriting of Miss Noble and was addressed to her mother.

When Kolb was told that Miss Noble had accused him, he said:

"Irene would not lie, but I do not think she said that. I want to hear her say it."

Kolb was taken before her, and she repeated the charge.

**INFECTED WATER
CAUSES PELLAGRA**

**Italian Scientists Claim to
Have Made Most Important
Discovery.**

ROME, May 31.—Pellagra, the mysterious skin disease prevalent in semi-tropical climates, which has baffled medical authorities for nearly 200 years, is caused by infected water, according to Professors Scala and Alessandrini of the Institute of Hygiene in Rome.

The scourge has long been ascribed to the consumption of bad corn, but according to the professor's announcement, they have found that in the districts of Italy where the disease is most prevalent the water is infected with flint stone in collidial solution.

The professors declare that the theory of the maise ptomaine is altogether groundless. They are endeavoring to induce the authorities to proceed with a thorough examination of all the waters of the infected districts and rid Italy of a plague which claims 50,000 cases annually. The professors have found that the infected water may be easily made safe for drinking purposes by putting into it a quantity of carbonated chalk.

In the United States a commission, whose work has been made possible by a gift of \$15,000 from Colonel Robert M. Thompson of New York, and John H. McFadden of Philadelphia, has been at work for over a year in a study of cases of pellagra in the southern states. The commission's final report is yet to be issued.
