RECOGNITION FOR FATHER

Day Is Set Aside For Him at
First Baptist Church.

DOLLAR MARK ON HIS
BACK IS DEPLORED

Dr. Powell Calls Attention to "Money-
Making Machines" in Human
Form—Outlines Problems
of Fathers.

"In this age to meet all the require-
ments the average father depends upon
his ability to make money like a ma-
chine without becoming a money-making
machine," said Dr. W. F. Powell yes-
terday morning in the course of a ser-
mon on the subject, "The Magnitude of
a Father's Ministry." The service was
set apart in observance of Fathers' day
and the church was well filled with fa-
thers, accompanied by their families.

The pastor said:

"Many a father's life is ground out
because somebody put on his back a
dollar mark, and he is just a money-
making machine. He is valued no
higher than his productive power. That
is the problem; to succeed in a calling
without becoming a slave to that calling
—to own a business without being
owned by that business. These are
thoughts for Fathers' day.

"There is another problem. Beyond
the problems, competitors and crises of
business through which he must pass
as a thousand Gethsemanes in the marts
of trade, there is the problem of social
position for his wife and children. How
hard it is for a father to try night
and day and see another's children en-
joy position and preparation for life
which he covets in vain for his own, for
generally the position which he attains
is the position they hold.

"The deepest stab to a father's heart
is not the failure of fortune—deeper
still is the failure of his family to have
things which a fortune would secure for
them.

"But the father faces a task further
reaching than the enterprise or the issue
of a business—his obligation to his
home. The best investment he makes
is a well and respectably reared family,
whose manhood will be above money and
whose womanhood will be greater riches
than rubies. After all it is a great
waste to leave a fortune to a fool. If
you fail in business, be a success as a
father. It is a greater thing to be the
father of a boy who is worth a million
dollars and who hasn't got a cent than
it is to be the father of a boy who
has a million dollars and who isn't worth
a cent. Many a boy cannot run a thing
his father leaves him except his au-
tomobile."

Pointing out the magnitude of the les-
son, "Like as a father," the speaker
said:

"Contemplate this symbolism of a di-
vine fatherhood over human life here and
its touch transfigures the commonplace
things and transforms human beings
from creatures of earth to children of
heaven. Interpret God in the terms of
human fatherhood and that view of God
lengthens life's vistas and lifts the sky
above the human soul.

"The truth of the lesson which makes
the fatherhood of God the foremost
phase of His relation to us places life
above law.

"This Father writes His laws in the
living souls of growing men. The basis
of our being therefore is not legal, but
biological.

"And through our co-operation with
such a Father the life that now is will
be bettered and made more abundant.

"The lesson of a Divine Father's love
to men, 'Like as a father pitieth his
children, so the Lord pitieth them that
fear Him.' How personal is such pity.
How tender such compassion. How
precious is such a love. He knows all
of our heartaches. He yearns to help
at every point of the soul's need. His
concern in your life is a father's solici-
tude for his son."
