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### DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The Whitworth College Development Program as set forth in January, 1937, calls for the raising of three and a half million dollars over a period of the next 21 years. The 21-year period was adopted, since the end of that period marks the 75th anniversary of the founding of the College. It is hoped that by that date an endowment fund of a million and three quarters and a capital investment of the same amount will have been raised. This sum will provide adequately on the present value of the dollar for a thousand student enrollment.

In order to raise this total sum of three and a half million dollars in 21 years, an average of \$166,000 annually over and above operating expenses must be realized. Already during this first year of the Development Program a total of \$108,462.72 has been raised.

For the second year of the program we have set as our goal a total of \$125,000 to be expended as follows: Operating expenses for the year 1937-38, \$25,000; women's dormitory, \$75,000; central heating plant, \$25,000.

At the meeting of the Synod of Washington in Seattle in July, 1937, it was voted to support the college to the extent of \$50,000. The additional \$75,000 is expected to be raised in the City of Spokane. A permanent citizen's committee known as our Board of Advisers has already been set up for this purpose. Already \$10,000 of this \$75,000 has been pledged.

The plan for the raising the \$50,000 among the churches of the Synod is to publicize the Whitworth College program throughout the church groups following which an approach will be made to the individuals who can support the college program over and above the needs of the local church. Wherever feasible allocations will be made and that sum will be requested from the members of that particular church. A number of churches have already agreed to support the college to the extent of their ability in meeting their quota.

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In addition to the operation budget it is proposed that \$75,000 be raised for a women's dormitory and \$25,000 for a central heating plant.

## ENROLLMENT

Whitworth College closed its fall registration with a total enrollment of 217 as compared with 202 a year ago. Our total enrollment for the year will approximate 250 students. The student enrollment by classes is as follows: Post Graduate, 28; Senior, 26; Junior, 27; Sophomore, 50; and Freshman, 86. These students come from eight states in the Union as well as Alaska.

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## HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT

The Home Economics building, just being completed, is the newest addition to the physical plant of Whitworth. It is the first unit in the development program inaugurated a year ago.

Constructed to provide adequate facilities for one hundred young women, it also has living quarters for three faculty members, an office for the department head, and a reception room. Its laboratories are furnished with the most modern equipment.

As demand for the Home Economics work develops, new courses will be added to satisfy the needs of the students. This year a new course has been added in Color and Design, as well as one in Home Furnishing.

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## ADDITIONS TO THE FACULTY—NEW COURSES

The expansion of the curriculum in inaugurating courses leading to the Master of Arts and Master of Science degrees, necessitated the addition to the staff of Dr. Myron T. Clites. Dr. Clites assists in the Department of Education. This year he is instructing in High School Administration, Educational and Vocational Guidance, and Fundamentals of Statistics, as well as the standard courses in Education leading to an undergraduate major.

Miss Edith Serier, a graduate of the University of Washington Library School, has been put in charge of the library, and Mrs. Anna Carrell handles the piano instruction in the Department of Music.
