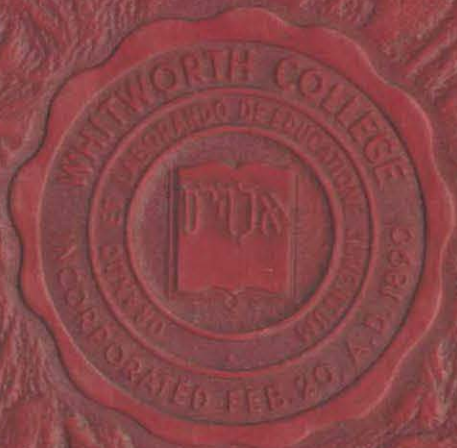

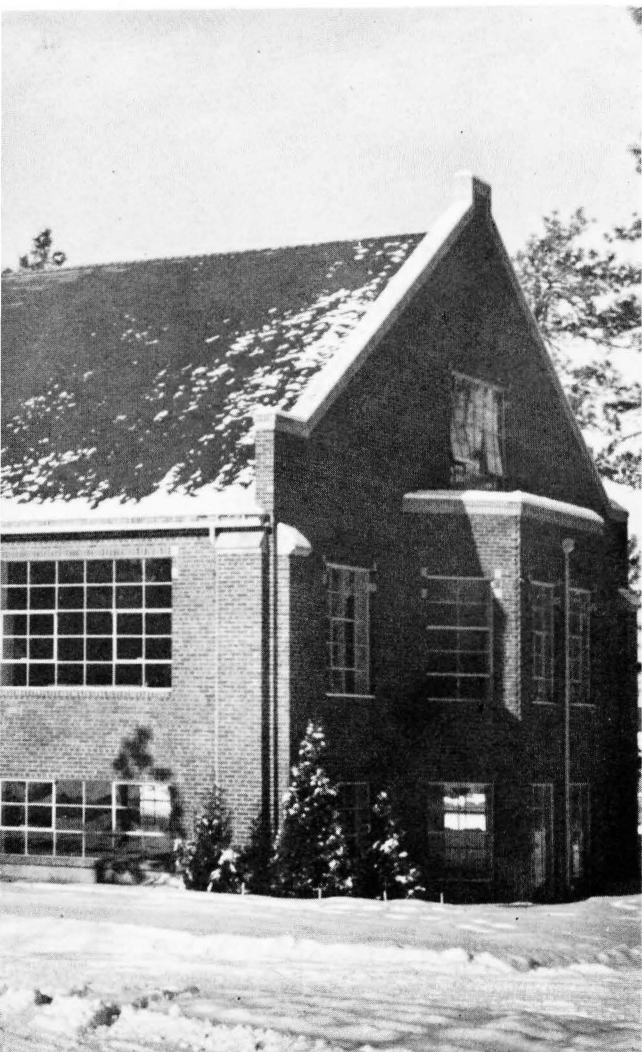

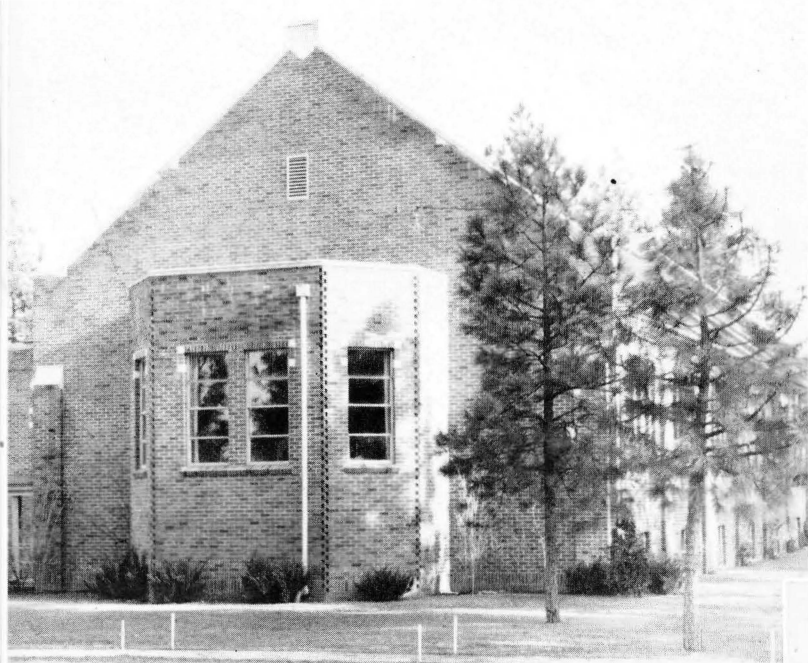
In Memoriam

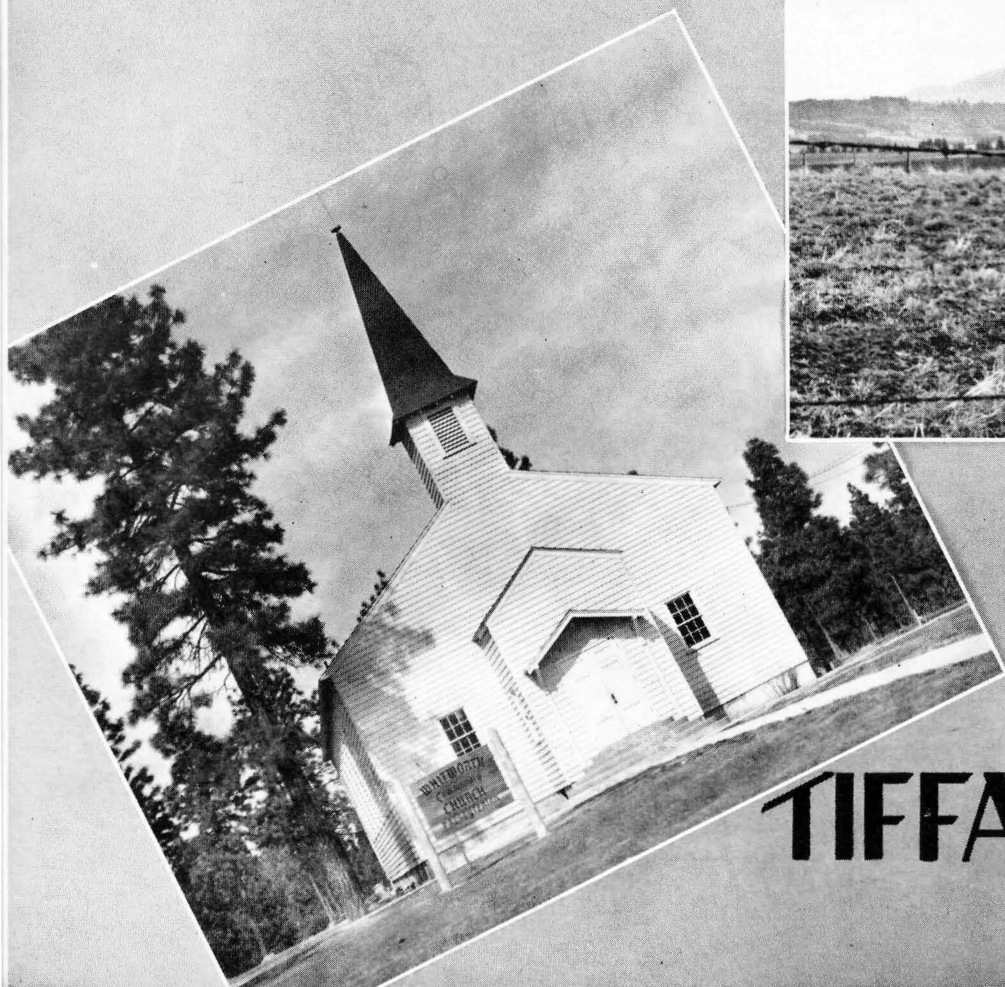

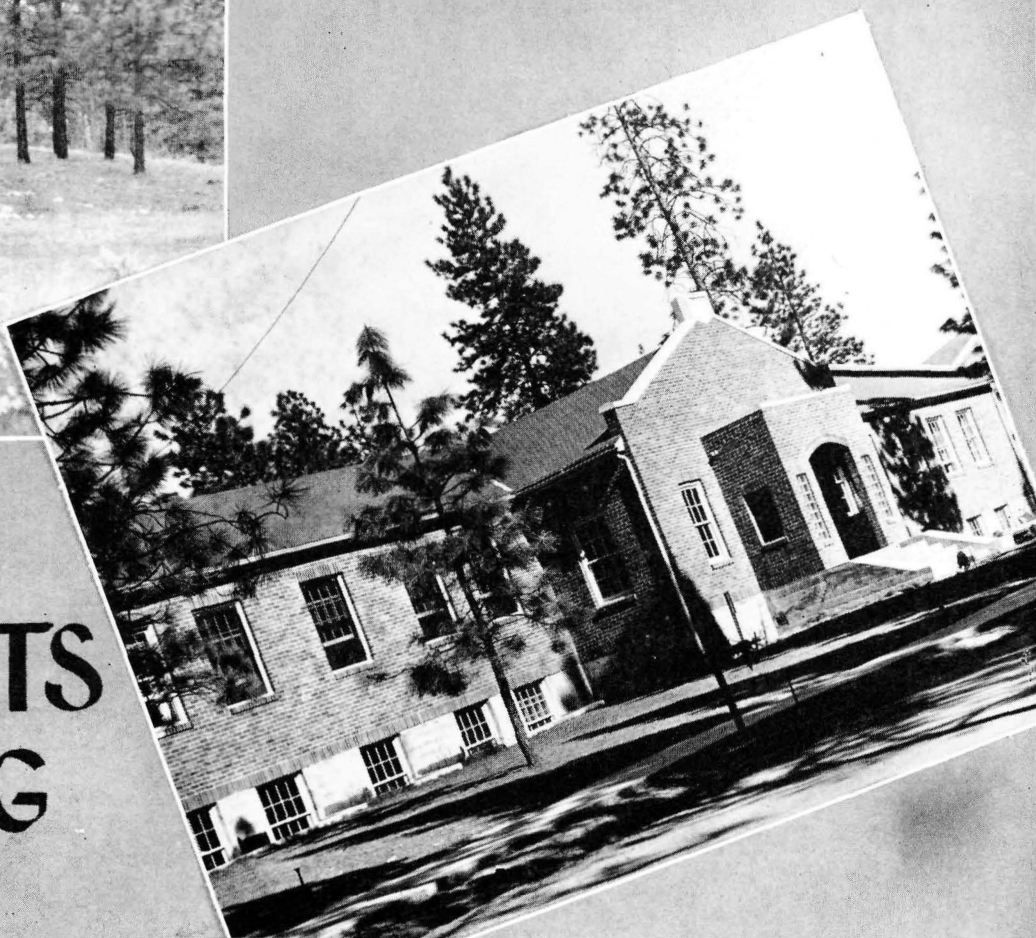

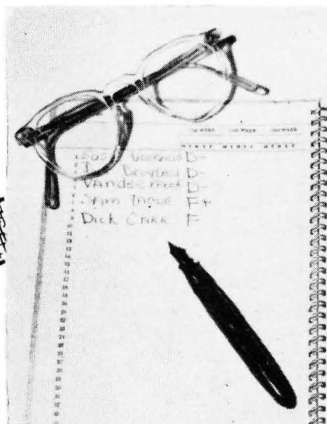

Physical growth of the college has kept the administrative staff busier this past year than in previous years. Miss Baldwin has written numerous letters to applicants, encouraging or discouraging as the circumstances for each applicant seemed to necessitate. Miss Jenkins and Dr. Maxson have the task of finding housing for students and helping students solve the problems they find in college life. The Business Manager of any college has no small office. At Whitworth Mr. Oakes handles the tuition of all students and the fees allotted to campus students three times each year, paying bills incurred by the college and giving students credit for work done.

These men and women deal almost exclusively with students. As dean of the college and faculty, Dr. Munn deals almost exclusively with the faculty. He works with the president in the hiring of new faculty members; he is head of the instruction, working out the curriculum and making changes in it; and he often spends time off the campus in the interests of the college. He is also a member of the faculty, teaching a few courses each quarter.

This staff cooperates with both the president and the students of the college for a more Christian college.

Another newcomer to the staff is Professor Larson, who is assisting Professor John Koehler in the Art department.

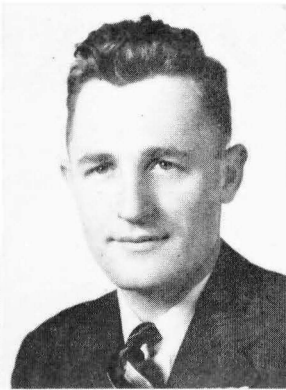

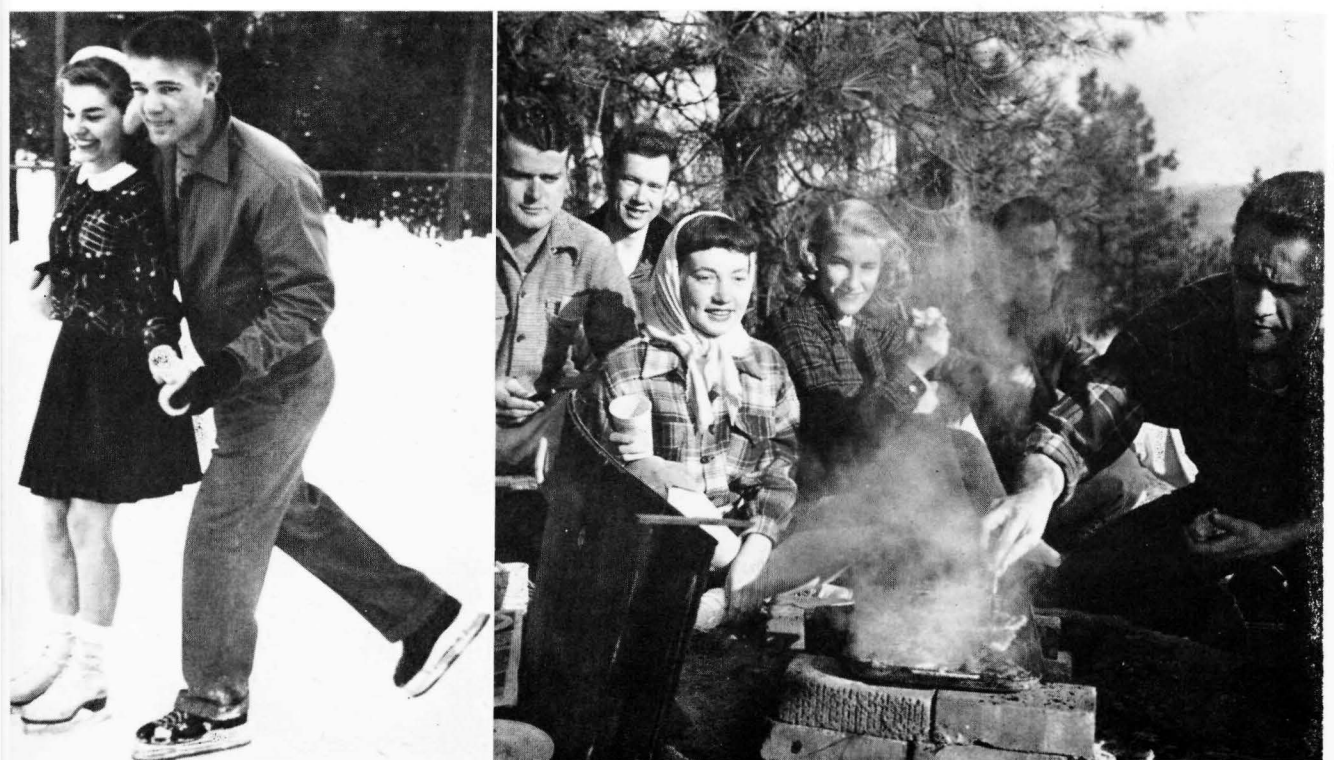

Pat Douglass, director of the "Chanters," was the man responsible for the musical styling for the A.K.X. presentation "Romance in Rio."





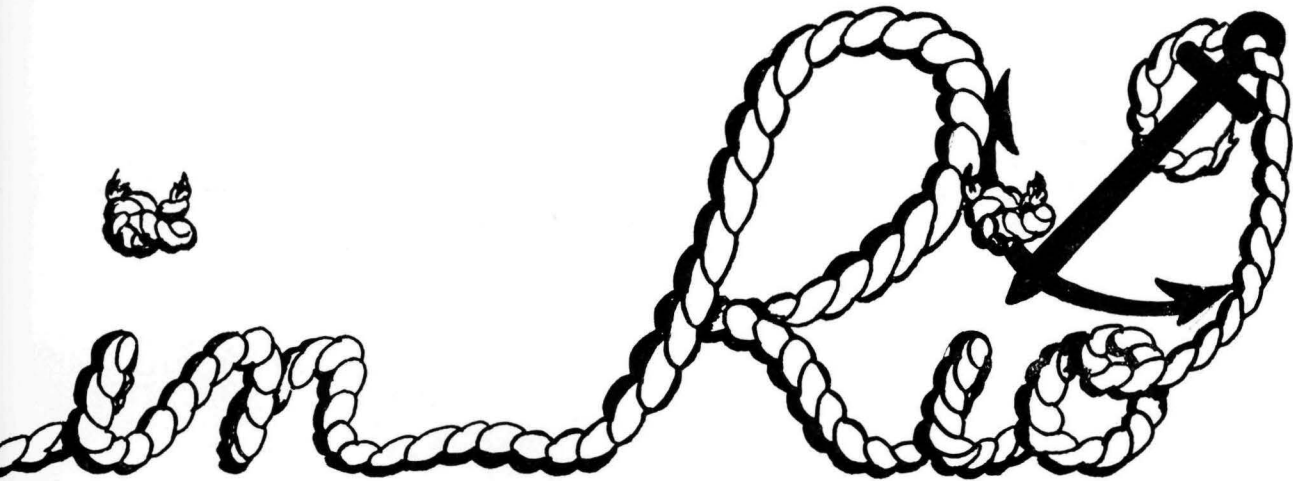

College Band

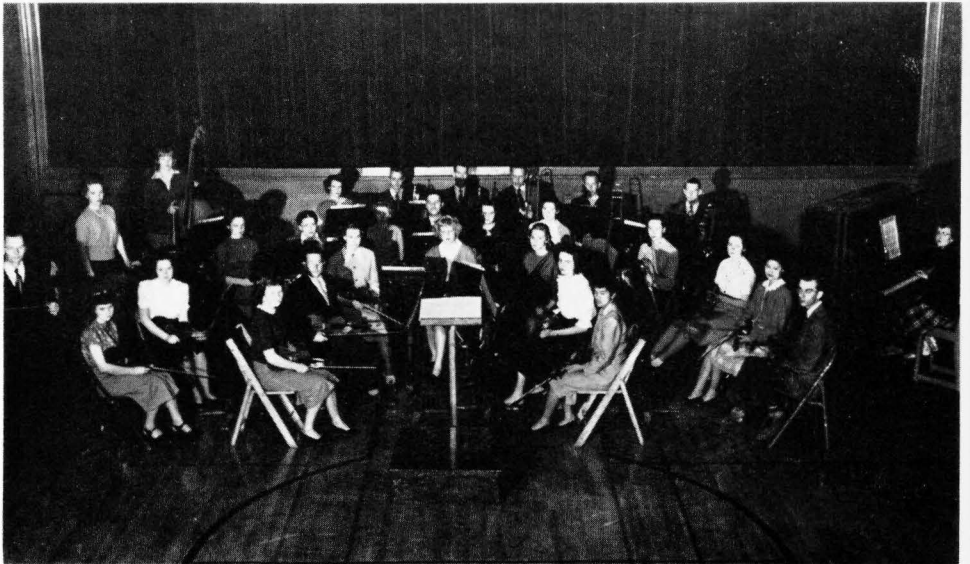

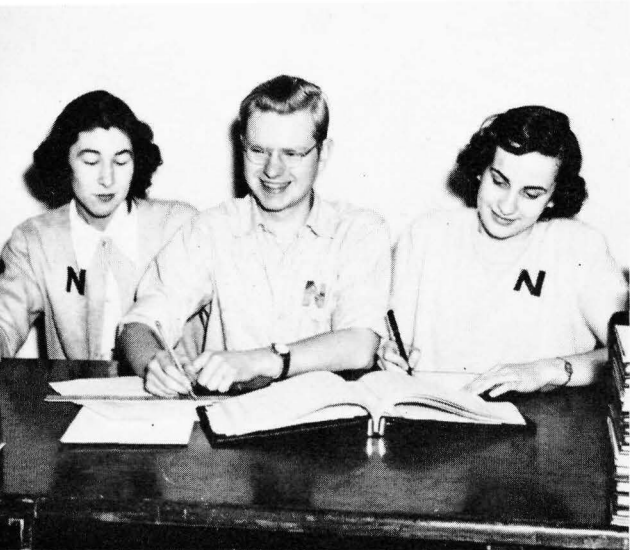

Christian Endeavor

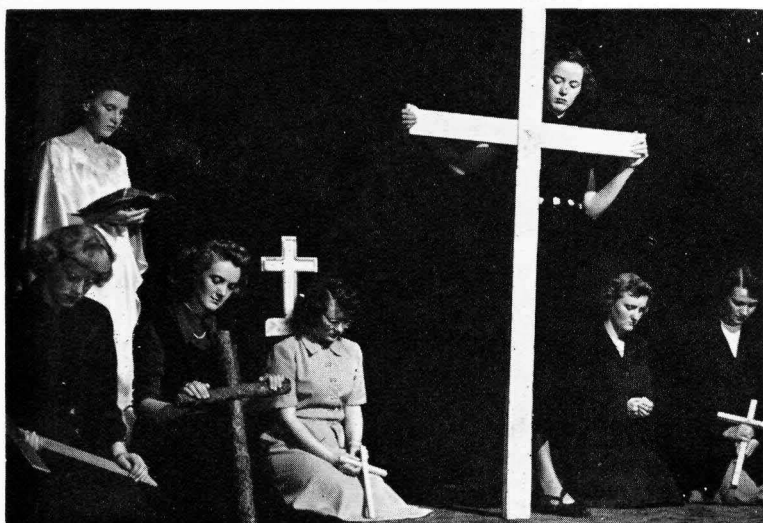

"Man's Disorder — God's Design" was the topic for this year's Spiritual Emphasis Week, held February 13 through 18. Dr. C. Vin White, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Lincoln, Nebraska was leader for the week. Having served seven years as Dean of Presbyterian Theological Seminary, Dubuque, Iowa, and having been an adviser for the National Council Westminster Fellowship, Dr. White's background give him a rich source from which to draw his messages. Dr. White has directed spiritual emphasis weeks on various other campuses throughout the country.

President Warren opened the week on Sunday evening with a message, "Life's Sure Foundation." About the people who build the superstructure of their lives on a firm Foundation, Dr. Warren said, "There's something about them that wins and challenges."

Dr. White brought ten messages to the student body in addition to a message for the town club given at a waffle supper in the Knox Presbyterian Church.



On prayer he said, "No man is so experienced that he cannot kneel down in prayer. No man is so learned that he cannot have the vocabulary for prayer. Don't cuddle any question in your heart because you think it will embarrass God." On transformation Dr. White said, "Christianity takes us as we are and makes us to become."

Saying that, "We don't have to be as we are," Dr. White explained, "The parable of the

talents indicates four facts basic to life. In the first place, each of us has vested in ourselves a Divine investment. Secondly, we are created with inequality. Next, the less talent we have, the more effort required to yield fruit. And last, judgment from the Divine throne is on the basis of productivity."

"The views of a Christian presuppose a proper perspective," Dr. White said, "and this perspective involves two elements—a long look and a shorter look at life."

The topic for one message was "That One Thing You Have That Jesus Wants." He ex-

plained, "Each of us has an atmosphere which is personally and singularly our own. This is our representative quality. Each of us stands for something whether we like it or not." Dr. White challenged the group to surrender this "representative quality" by saying, "God is King of all and each."

Spiritual Emphasis Week comes immediately after mid-term of the winter quarter, which marks the middle of the year. It is devoted to spiritual enrichment through Christ. Events of this week manifest the ideals for which Whitworth stands.

Missions Fellowship

The purpose of Missions Fellowship, which was organized last spring, is to present a challenge of missions in an organized manner and to prepare students for future Christian service.

As a coordinator of each mission society of the four Christian organizations on campus, this group, led by Lee Raibley, directs activities which include an hour-mission program each Sunday morning, mission gospel teams, mission prayer bands, and a mission table in the Library.

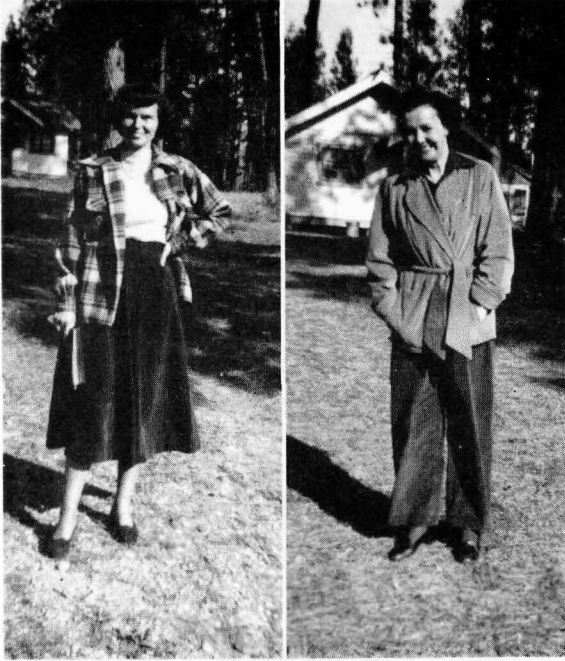

The theme verse was I Peter 3:2, "For even hereunto were ye called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye should follow in His Steps."

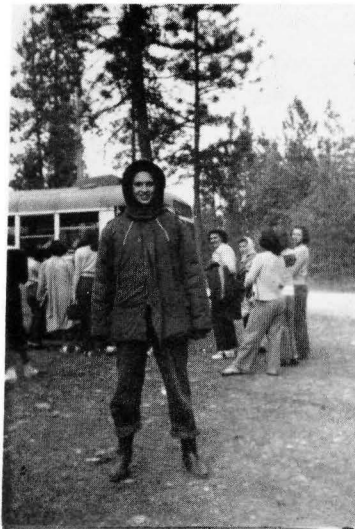

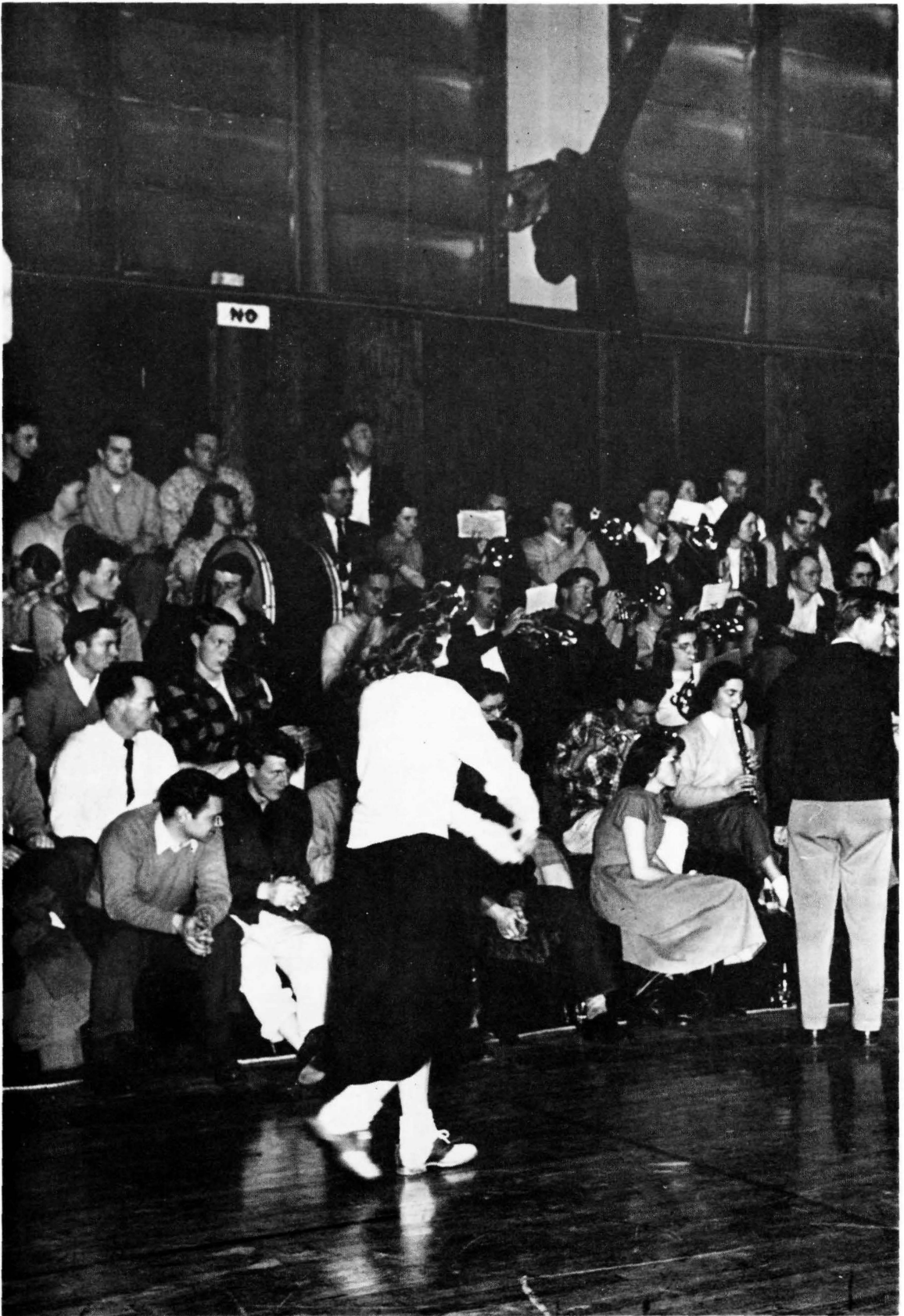

With Aron Rempel handling the coaching reins in his first turn as Pirate head football mentor, Whitworth college enjoyed its most successful post-war gridiron season in racking up four wins and a tie in nine starts.

Rempel, who was Buc line coach last year, called for opening practice the first week of September. Only 13 lettermen from the 1947 squad were on hand for the beginning workouts, but a number of freshmen and transfer players gave Rempel the makings of a well balanced team.

Athletic Director Jerry Stannard, last year's grid head, assisted Rempel in the coaching department. Stannard, who was a big factor in procuring the players for the 1947 squad, which was known as "the team that Jerry built," saw lettermen from his last year's crew form the nucleus of Rempel's 1948 eleven.

For every game last fall the Whits had a secret weapon in their "twelfth" man, Al Wylder. "Silent Al," popular Buc trainer, spent many hours in the training room giving players rub-downs and heat treatments, and nursing their aches and bruises in keeping the Pirate eleven in the best physical condition.

Credit goes to Ray Olson, team manager, who cared for the Pirates' field gear. The neatness of a well-kept equipment room exemplified "Ole's" motto, "a place for everything and everything in its place."



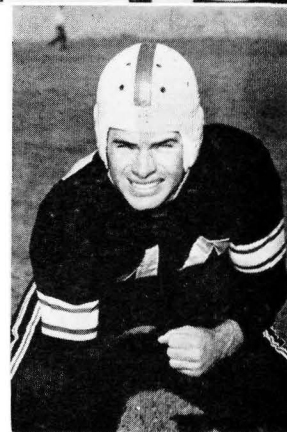
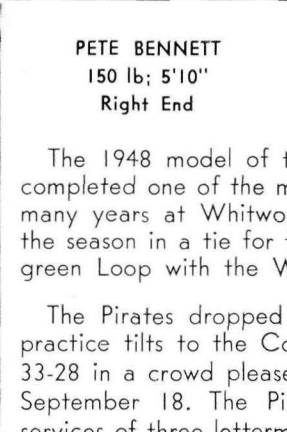
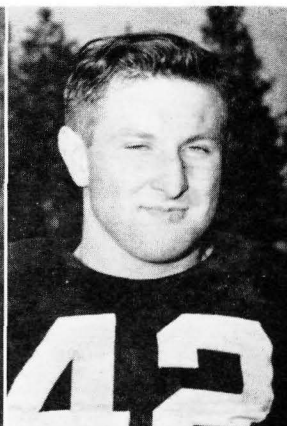
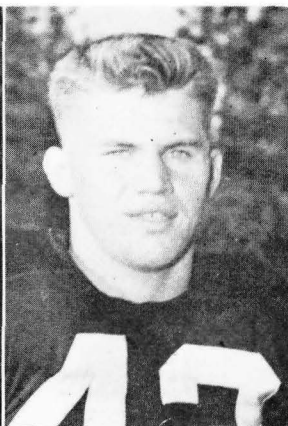
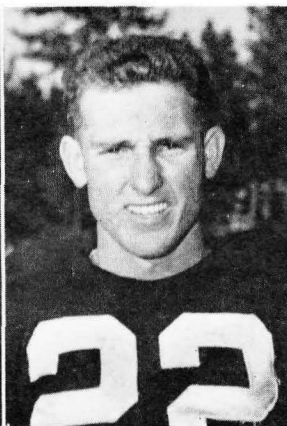
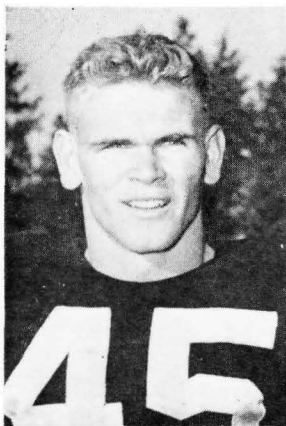

The 1948 model of the Pirate Grid machine completed one of the most successful seasons in many years at Whitworth. The Pirates finished the season in a tie for fourth place in the Evergreen Loop with the Wildcats of Central.

The Pirates dropped the first of their three practice tilts to the College of Idaho Coyotes 33-28 in a crowd pleaser at Caldwell, Idaho on September 18. The Pirates were without the services of three lettermen in this tilt, Kohlstadt, Jones, and Tucker.

The Whitworth Pirates knocked the North Idaho Loggers all over Ferris Field and came out on the long end of a 47-6 count. The Pirates unleashed a powerful scoring punch that Whit-

worth fans had not seen in the history of the school. The Pirates held the Loggers to no first downs for 55 minutes. The Loggers lone tally came in the last three minutes. The Whits touchdown parade netted seven T.D.'s of which Tucker tallied three, Cruzen two, Telecky one on an aerial tossed by Bennett, and Pomeroy one on a blocked kick by Lenten in the Logger end zone. Five of the seven conversions split the uprights which gave Cruzen an early season average of 11 of 13 attempts.

In the last practice session before conference tilts the Pirates downed the Missionaries of Whitman 14-6. Trailing by six points going into the third quarter Faber recovered a Whitman fumble and in two plays Tucker scampered 22 yards for the Pirates first touchdown. Cruzen converted to make the count 7-6 in favor of the Pirates. Midway in the fourth period the Pirates took over on downs on their own 40 and sparked by Elias the Pirates drove to the three yard

marker. Tucker again scored and Cruzen converted to wind up the scoring with the Whitworth lads leading 14-6. This gave the Pirates a record of two wins and one loss in practice sessions.

The Pirates dropped their league opener to the Loggers of C. P. S. 14-0. Early in the second period of the game the Loggers scored on a break. Later in the second period the Pirates made their strongest threat of the game when Kretz on his own 36 dropped back and flipped a long pass to Adams, who snagged it on the C.P.S. 22 and ran to the seven before being stopped. On a series of line plays and a jump pass the ball was worked down to the one and the Loggers held and took over on downs. The Pirates were strong in the third quarter as they dominated play but couldn't muster a real scoring drive. Early in the final stanza the Loggers intercepted a Pirate aerial and raced 55 yards for their final tally.

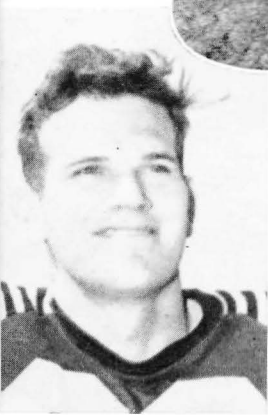

On Saturday, October 16, the Pirates invaded the home grounds of Eastern's Savages and dropped a thrilling game to the Savages 14-13. The Pirates matched the highly favored Savs in the touchdown department but were unable to split the uprights for that crucial extra point. The heavy Savs wasted no time in bullying their way to an early score on a 65 yard mark after taking the kickoff. In the second period the Pirates were deep in their own territory when Tucker took the ball and, thanks to a couple of timely blocks, he was on his way for a 93 yard gallop for a touchdown. The Savages tallied only one more as the Pirate defense always dug in when deep in the goal post shadows. The last Whit score came on an aerial from Kretz to Adams good for 57 yards and six points. This game was the second time in 24 years that the Pirates have scored on the Savages. In 1941, Bruce McCullough, present public relations director, made the only other score in the long touchdown draught.

The Pirates broke into the win column in league play by dumping Western 12-6 at Ferris Field, October 23. The Pirates, unable to make much through Western's heavy line, took to the air and scored their first tally on that great combination of Kretz to Adams early in the second quarter. The Vikings made their lone tally in the third period when the ball was moved close to the goal line on a series of penalties. Davis intercepted two forwards in sparking the brilliant Pirate pass defense. The offense was sparked by the glue fingered ends of Adams and Telecky. Lentes, Olstad and Faber were outstanding on the defense.



The Pirates dropped their third league game, a heartbreaker, to P.L.C. The homecoming crowd stood stunned by the sudden Lute uprising in the final period. The combination of Kretz and Adams was good for the Whits two tallies in the first and fourth periods. After the Whitworth tally in the fourth period, the Lutes ran the kickoff back for a touchdown catching the Whits in a momentary lapse. The Pirates then drove to the five yard stripe but were unable to score and the Lutes took over and tallied on the next play on a long pass as the time ran out.

On November 12, the Pirates invaded Olympia and crushed the Rangers from St. Martins, 32-7. The game was a rough affair with many penalties. Adams, Whitworth's Little All-American, scored three T.D.'s and Davis scored twice to complete the scoring for the Whits.

On November 19, the "Battle of the Mud" took place at Whitworth's Pine Bowl. It was the grid final against Central Washington. This was the game to decide who would end the season in fourth place, for both teams entered the game with four wins and four losses. The game could better be tabbed a swimming meet because of the condition of the field. There was only one scoring threat in the game and again it was the combination of Kretz to Adams that set up Whitworth's one chance with a long pass to the Central 20 yard line. But there the mud took its hold and the hit scoring machine bogged down. The game ended in a 0-0 tie.

The Pirates closed their ten game schedule with four wins, four losses, and one tie. The Pirates missed the services of such men as Durham, Shalock, Tucker and Elias who were plagued with injuries throughout the season. The outstanding play of Adams, Tucker, Olstad, Lentas, Kretz, Faber and Jones, as well as the entire team is what brought Whitworth up from the long slump in football.

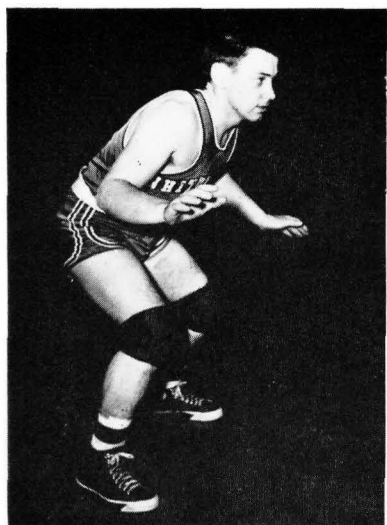
Assisting Stannard in behind-the-scenes duties were Dick Walker, team manager, and Al Wylder, team trainer.

Eleven varsity letters were handed out with Earl Mortlock, Bill Roffler, Wayne Conner, Clyde

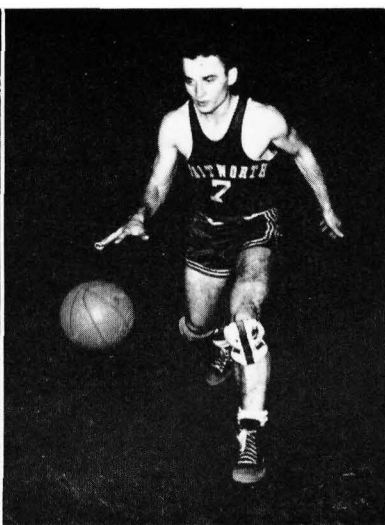

For fifteen casaba tilts Graves' Gymnasium on Whitworth's pine-clad campus was filled with the roaring enthusiasm of loyal Pirates and other rooters cheering for their respective teams. Ushering in the season with a 66-34 loss to the Washington State Cougars, the Pirate five split a series with the N.I.C.E. Loggers to begin their slow, but sure, winning streak. The Pirate squad was a potentially strong team but they found it hard to win games against tough opposition.

Capturing two wins from the College of Idaho on their home floor during the Christmas vacation, the Pirates dropped N.I.C.E. again to make a two out of three win in the series. Jumping into an early lead and being by-passed by the Loggers with eight minutes gone in the first half, the Whits tied it up 24-24 as the buzzer sounded. With Mortlock high point man for the Pirates, the contest provided the fans with sharp shooting accompanied by a fast breaking style of play.

The Western Washington Vikings caught Whitworth in a 66-57 whirlwind that lasted all the way with the score tied nine times and the lead changing hands eleven times. Both the half-time and final scores were tied leading to an overtime period. U.B.C., a newcomer to the Evergreen competition this year, met the Pirates for the first time and won their first victory for the season.

With Clyde Matters ringing the hoop for 20 points, the Whit hoop squad upset St. Martins 74-63 for their first non-conference win this season. Hitting forty per cent of their shots the Whits took an early lead and held the Rangers to a low level.

Using a new system of substitution the Pirates chalked up two wins in non-league competition on their own floor. Coach Jerry used two units operating alternately throughout the games. Trailing Whitman after five minutes of play Don Cameron ran wild, giving the Pirates a ten point edge which they maintained during the remainder of the game to defeat the Missionaries 67-55. Playing steadily but slowly in the first half, Whitworth caught fire in the last period to subdue North West Nazarene 70-54. The Crusaders' forward attempted single-handedly to turn the tide, but with control of the backboard Whitworth kept a large margin.

Battling their traditional Cheney rival, Pirate hoopsters were walloped in two enthusiastically played encounters by Eastern Washington. Taking advantage of the Pirates' off-moments, the

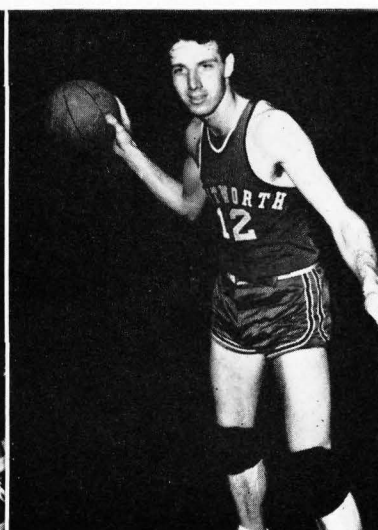
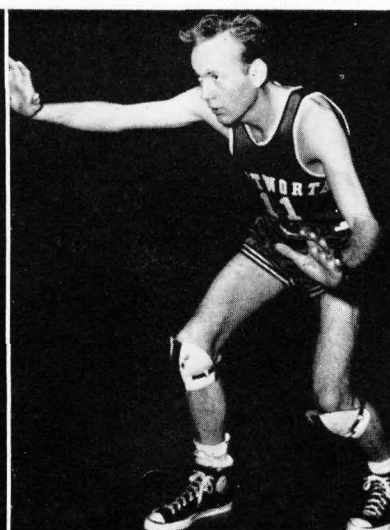
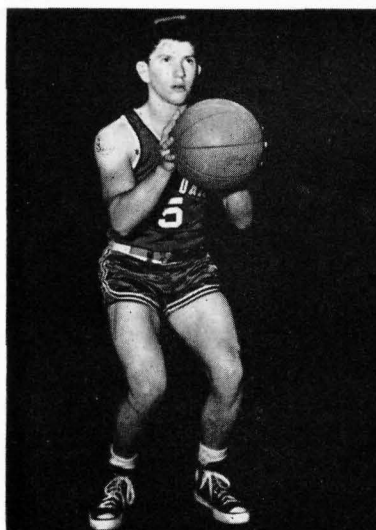

The varsity quintette headed west a second time to engage in a nip-and-tuck contest with Central Washington tying the Wildcats six times, with the lead changing fourteen times, only to face defeat in Ellensburg to the tune of 49-47. At Tacoma the Pirate cagers were nosed out by two points by Pacific Lutheran in a hard fought tilt with high scoring Don Cameron and center Al Good being unable to play because of stomach upsets. The game ended with the Lutes in the lead, 57-55.

Winning another set of games on their home floor, Whitworth met the Canadian five in a spectacular battle which started out to be a near rout for the Pirates. The U.B.C. Thunderbirds kept things hot for the Pirates during the last seven minutes of play. Earl Mortlock broke loose for a Pirate lay-up to give Whitworth the lead and the Northern boys fell behind to lose 57-53. Center Al Good led the Whits to a 71-61 victory over Western Washington. The game was won mostly by baffling trick hook shots from the side of the key.

The last week in February found Whitworth with their best road stand on the third trip to the coast. Downed by College of Puget Sound the first night, the Pirates went on to score a win over St. Martins 61-55, and wallop Seattle Pacific in two non-league games.

The opener with the Falcons starred center Clyde Matters who scored nineteen points and was backed up by Cameron and Mortlock to score a win of 60-47. Making it two wins in a row, the Pirates downed Seattle Pacific College 74-69. Here Earl Mortlock, speedy forward, collected nineteen points, five of them breaking a 69-69 deadlock.

Ending the season with a tour south to La Grande, Oregon, the Pirates split a pair with E.O.C.E. which were unannounced on the regular schedule. Running wild in the two game set, the Whitworth five dropped the first contest 68-59, but turned the tables to grab a phenomenal 95-81 victory in the second tilt. Half-time favored Eastern Oregon in the latter game, but with Bill Roffler's shooting and "Pop" Conner's fine defensive playing, the Pirate five came out on top with the highest scoring game of the year.

Clyde Matters, who won the Pirette Inspirational Award for two previous years, shared the honor with Wayne Conner this year. Honorary captains for the season were Gordy Brandt and Clyde Matters, chosen by their teammates for outstanding leadership.

Baseball

Gerald M. Stannard, known as coach "Jerry", took over the coaching position and head of the physical education department back in 1934. He picked up where coach "Snowy" Gustafson left off working for "better athletics" for Whitworth.

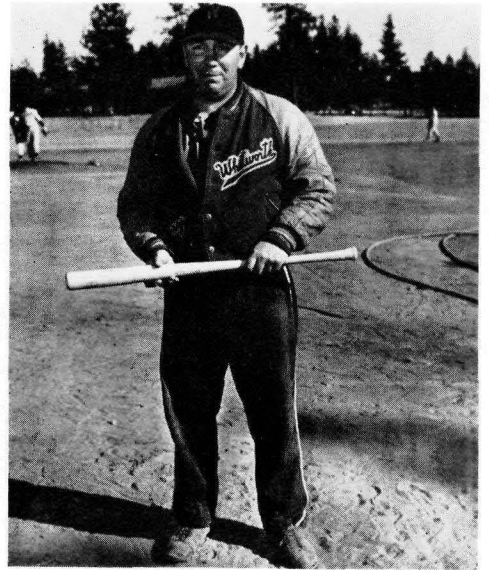
In that year, Coach "Jerry" was handicapped in football by the fact that only 17 men turned out, practically all inexperienced in football. Six lettermen and the remaining athletes composed the nucleus for that year's team. Efforts paid off in full; this year Coach Stannard found 42 men on the gridiron as compared with the few of past years.

Along came the Pearl Harbor incident, and soon Coach Stannard was in the Navy as chief petty officer, in which capacity he served over a period of three years. First, it was 18 months with the Seabees, then Puerto Rico and back stateside to Farragut Naval Training Station.

The Physical Education Department headed by Coach Stannard is composed of Aron Rempel, who trained under the famous Alonzo Stagg, and Mrs. Cheska, director of women's athletics. Student-assistants for this year were David Holmes and Clyde Matters.

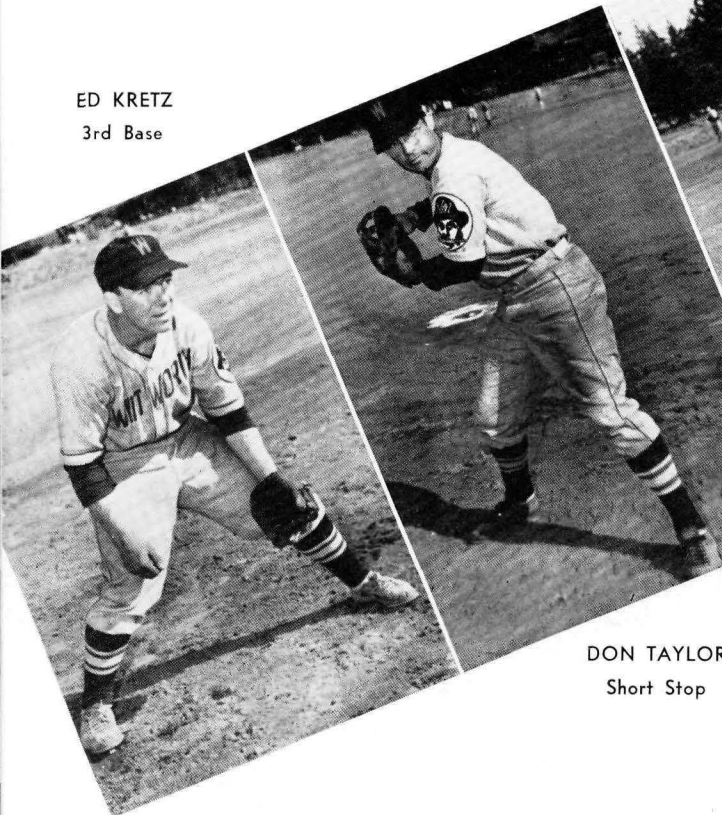

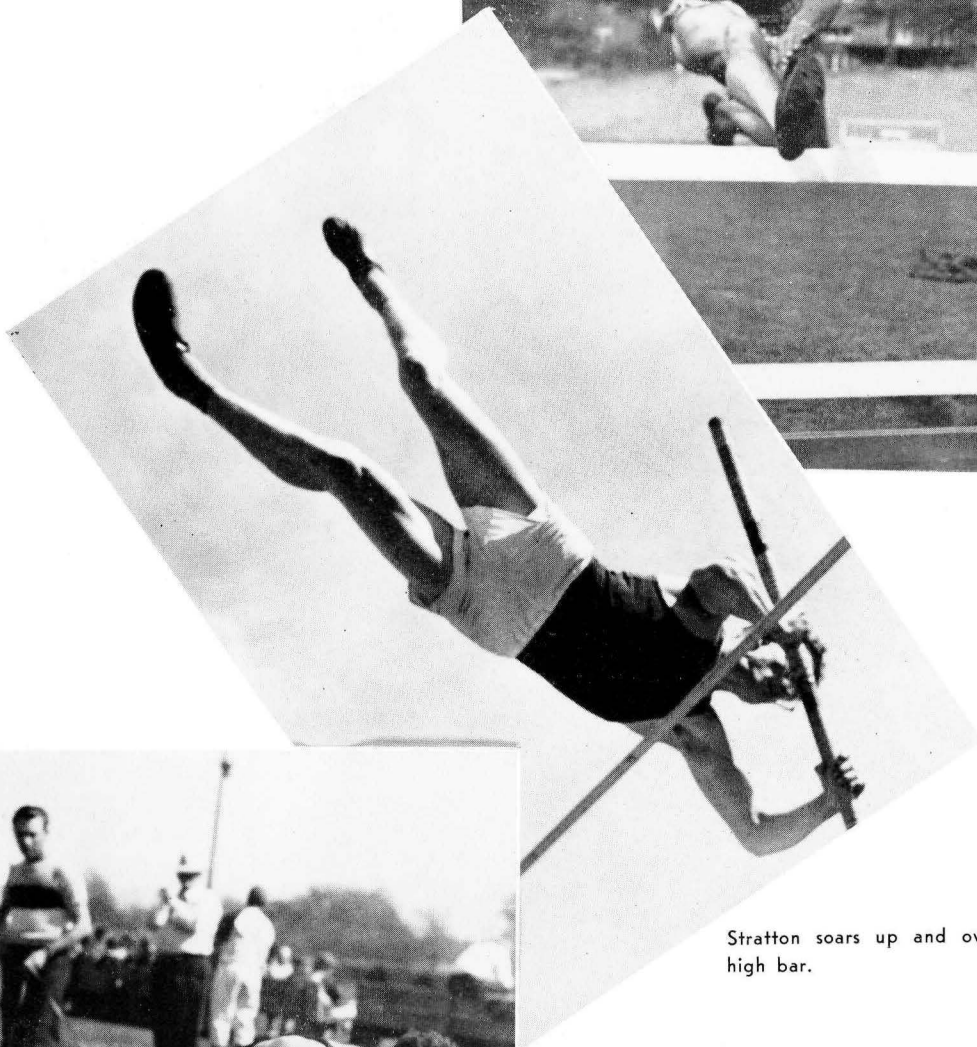

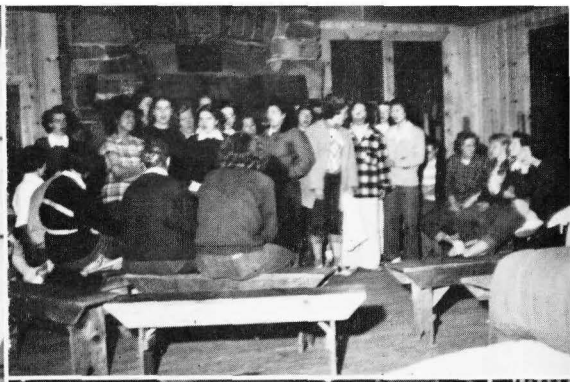

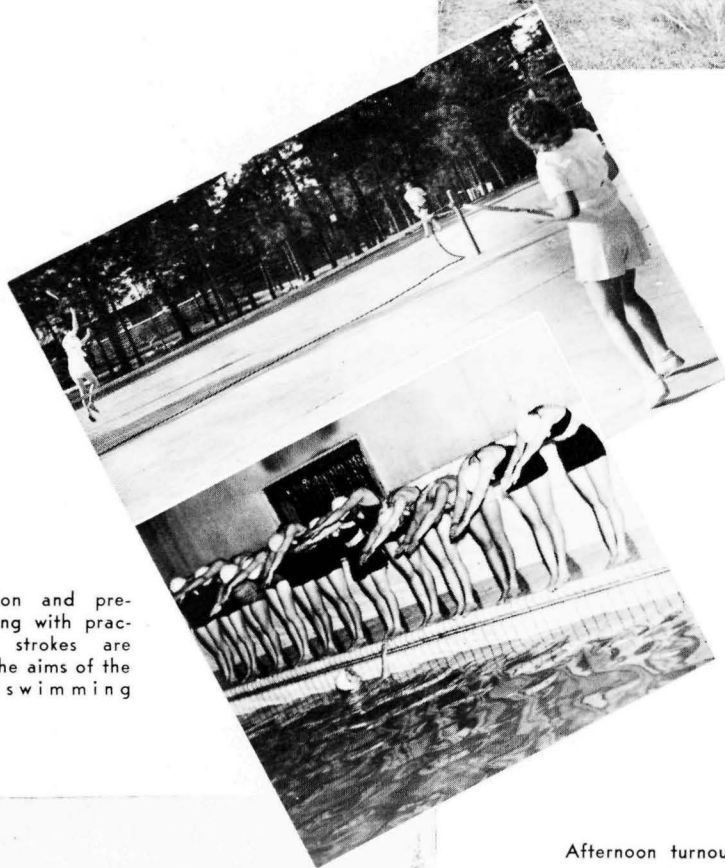
Moving on into the winter season, the basketball fever hit the women.

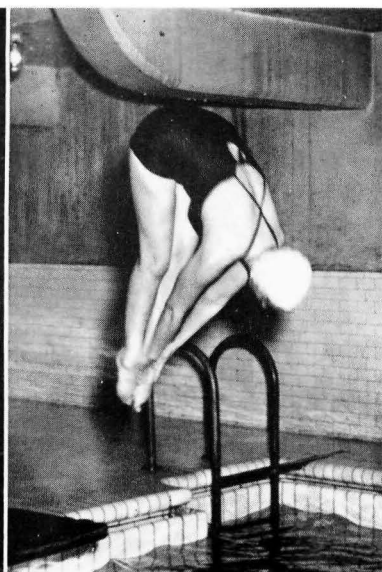
Afternoon turnouts for softball bring from ten to twenty girls out into the sunshine to take their turns at bat.

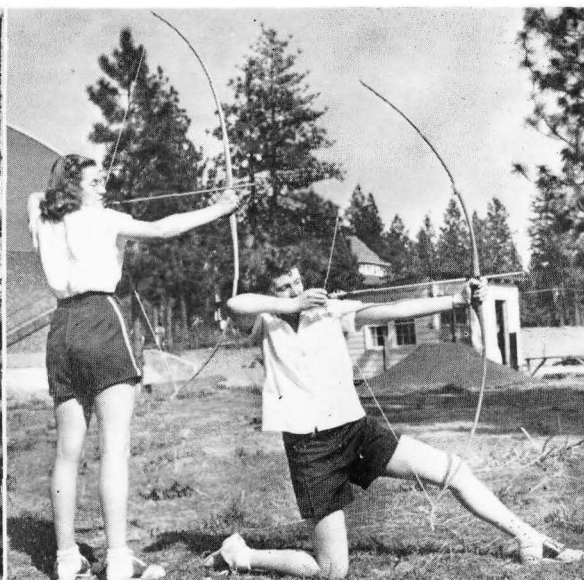
