

# History.

A century is a long time for a dream to endure, but George Whitworth's dream of a 'good parochial school offering a good English education and a thorough religious training' has done just that. His dream was actualized in 1883 in the town of Summer, Washington. How this dream materialized and the events that brought Whitworth College to what it is today is a story worth learning.

George Whitworth was a man of many characteristics. He was trained as a minister, a lawyer, and a harness maker. But above all, he was a man with a dream. The dream and the desire to create a Presbyterian colony on the Puget Sound and a religious academy enabled him and fifty families to start a journey; a journey that brought them from the Ohio Valley through the great plains and finally to the Pacific Northwest. When George Whitworth reached Portland, Oregon in 1853, only his family remained from the original travelers.

For a period of 30 years, Whitworth's dream was deferred and he lived his life as an outstanding citizen of the Pacific Region.

Finally, his dream was revived in the form of Summer Academy, located southeast of Tacoma, in the village of Summer, Washington. Seven years later, on February 20, 1889, George Whitworth's dream was realized when Summer Academy was incorporated into Whitworth College.


The college moved from Summer to Tacoma, Washington in 1899 then to Spokane in 1914. The move to Spokane was made possible by the generosity of Jay P. Graves when he donated 640 acres of the Country Homes Estate to Whitworth College.

Whitworth College had a rocky beginning in Spokane. High faculty and administrative turnover marked the early years. The school weathered a year long closure due to World War I, threats of consolidation, financial troubles, and a fire that destroyed most of the campus.



Despite the rough start in Spokane, Whitworth has survived.

A century later, the college still upholds the standards set by the founding father, George Whitworth. Whitworth called for standards that would give the college exemplary christian values. Teachers were not only chosen for their scholastic accomplishments but also for their personal qualities, love of teaching, and their personal relationship with God. He also stressed the importance of the physical well-being of the students, attention to the social life of the student, their spiritual life and their moral and religious values. George Whitworth insisted on a college that produced a well rounded and educated student that was willing to be one step above the rest.

Today Whitworth College celebrates George Whitworth's dream with extreme pride.









**Location.** Located 300 miles east of Seattle, Spokane is the capital of the great Inland Empire with a population of 270,500.

Spokane is surrounded by wheat fields to the south and dense forests to the north. This ideal setting helped make Spokane the location of the 1974 World's Fair. Riverfront Park was built specifically for the event and houses the Ice Pavilion, IMAX theater, a handmade carousel, and acres of park in a downtown setting.

Downtown, one can experience the finest in ballet, drama, symphony and many other cultural events in the Spokane Opera House. Major department stores connected with skywalks, the city court house, and the Spokane Falls are also major sites in the downtown area.

However, the best known places to Whitworth students are Dick's Burgers and the Milk Bottle Ice Cream Shop. Built in 1935, the Milk Bottle has seen many Whitworth students come and go through the past five decades. Dick's Hamburgers is not a new-comer to the Spokane area either. Established in the 50's the hamburger stand has not changed, and this includes the prices. You can still buy a burger for 49¢.

Leaving the downtown area towards Whitworth College, north on Division, the city dissipates into forest. With the city of Spokane to the south of Whitworth and snow covered hills to the north, who could ask for a better location.





**People.** It's 9:00 a.m. and Whitworth begins its day with Core. An observer would see all kinds of different and unique people: an Oriental girl from Southern California, a Texan cowboy wearing boots and Levi's, a blond guy wearing a Hawaiian-print shirt and thongs and a girl who's never been out of Washington.




Going to the HUB to check their mailboxes is a freshman, who was a cheerleader in high school, and a straight A senior, majoring in business. Together they determine that SAGA, not money, is the root of all evil. Whitworth's students have begun their day.

**Homecoming.** Intensive, busy, and exciting. These are the only words that can describe the 1986 Oktoberfest Homecoming. New traditions blossomed into welcome changes.

Activities filled every day starting on Monday with a rootbeer chug. The other days included an Iron Man race, VW stuff, pie-eating contest, and were closed in the evening by a talent competition. Saturday, before the game, a parade of music and floats created by each dorm proceeded through the campus. From all of the competitions, points were tallied to see which class candidates for Homecoming King and Queen would be crowned.





The Board of Trustees arrived for their meeting early in the week and observed many of the activities. The fall musical, "Damn Yankees," contributed three rousing performances to the weekend. The pressure of midterms loomed over most of the students. For many, participating in everything became a juggling act because of this and Parent's Weekend.

Parents came from all over to visit the campus and their son or daughter. Excitement to see family again added to the hectic schedule. Mini-league offered parents an opportunity to understand the school and its programs better.

More than 300 people attended the semi-formal where the coronation of the sophomore candidates Jim Ownes and Cindy Nobriga was held.










# The Weekend







# Positive Outlook Lines Up

"You have to learn how to lose before you can learn how to win," confessed senior defensive end Mike Valente. The football team had the opportunity to learn many valuable lessons from the outcome of the season.

A final record of 2-7 didn't stop our team from having a "successful" season. One of their main goals was attained. A love, understanding, and trust developed among the players and staff. They all agreed that the conscious awareness for the needs of others on the team by each individual constituted a special group of people, according to Head Coach Grambo. Senior Tim Hoppus, and offensive line guard shared, "I gained tons of new friends and grew very close to some." This statement rang true through the team, as did a strong sense of caring. "There was a play that I threw a 22 yard pass to Steve Turbin, my friend and roommate, and he hurt his knee. It hurt me too ... very much," expressed Rick Bolen, quarterback.

Another lesson taken as an example of life stemmed from the season, and the guys applied it well. "We've seen that there are peaks and valleys. Everything doesn't always go the way you want it, but a real sign of character is being able to get back on the horse and reset goals," explained the football staff. For example, "Our guys didn't quit even though we were overmatched in the PLU game, they kept going and fought back," boasted Defensive Line Coach Bobby Williams. He also shared that Whitworth played a very "mental" game. Western Washington, a physically stronger team, hit extremely hard, but the Bucs believed they could beat them because they had in the past. Sure enough, they smeared them all over the field.


The same attitude prevailed at the Homecoming game against Lewis and Clark. Senior Ken Hoppus, an offensive line guard that made the First Team All-Conference divulged, "It was a great feeling to walk off the field after dominating and controlling another team for a whole game."

The small number of team members and the fact that academics came before football had influence on the performance of the team. They played schools that were national NAIA champions and had scores of talented players to put on the field after an injury. Whitworth suffered many injuries, but didn't have replacements. Even with these obstacles, the team will always be known for individual records. Senior Wayne Ralph, a two year All-American wide receiver, set incredible records. (Refer to caption for details.) He credited, "I feel it's a total team record. It couldn't have been done without the talent found among the players. I'm glad I could play with such outstanding people." The number of passes he received exceeds that of any other human being in the history of football. Ken Hoppus commented, "It was great playing with Wayne. It will be something I'll never forget for the rest of my life."

Coach Grambo shared how there was something inside of Wayne that accomplished his high achievement, an intensity rarely seen. "I thank the coaches very much for giving me the opportunity to play at an institution like Whitworth," expressed Wayne.

In actuality, the team profited from the season. Coach Grambo summed it up by saying, "We can draw upon our lessons and extend ourselves to recover. It was a special group of people from all classes that came together at a Christian institution and built understanding and friendship."







Whitworth can be very proud. The team worked strongly as a unit and proved that they could compete with such a hard schedule and could beat high caliber teams.










ly Hills, UCLA, Disneyland, and of course the Rose Bowl.


As the season progressed, the team grew to stick together and play together in precision.






# Sweat Pays off for Lady Bucs


## Trey Malicoat — Financial V.P.





# Volleyball Club — Fun and Competition








# The International Club — An Intercultural Experience





# Those at the Top Who Call the Shots

## Dr. Robert Mounce

Whitworth College President, Dr. Robert Mounce, retired after close to seven years in the position. He leaves numerous lasting effects in his wake.

Dr. Mounce's influence in retiring 1.5 million of a 2 million operating debt, involvement in hiring over 50% of the present faculty, and raising teachers' salary 64% in a period of seven years are just a few of his accomplishments while in office.

Another prominent effect that, "is broadly accepted is that Whitworth has reaffirmed its commitment as a college to the historic Christian stance," said Dr. Mounce. He continued to explain that Whitworth never lost touch with its purpose while other colleges were in a constant drift towards secularism in the troubled times after Vietnam. "We have gone against that current."

Dr. Mounce admitted looking forward to his retirement because of the many new opportunities that are opening up. Already the author of twelve books Mounce plans to continue working on the first of a series of commentaries of the New Testament.

In a few words to the students, Dr. Mounce encouraged the students at Whitworth to enjoy the age they are currently at, but "to move in to spiritual, social, and academic maturity for their own benefit."



## Dr. Darrell Guder

The Fall of 1985, was the beginning of Whitworth's Dean of Academics, Dr. Darrell Guder, career at Whitworth.

Whitworth's Christian commitment, mission goals, and faculty are what brought Dr. Guder to Spokane. Guder saw that his first goals were to work on international programs, enhance faculty ownership of academics, and strengthen Whitworth's liberal art education.

In his first two years Guder has been able to obtain those goals. Since the Fall 85 he has created the Berlin Encounter, designed faculty development groups, and has made sure that Whitworth has implemented its Christian goals.





### Dr. Julie Anderton

Dr. Julie Anderton, Vice President of Student Life, moved to Whitworth College after a stay at Westmont College in California. Anderton said, "the uniqueness and the broad mission of Whitworth as a Christian school," attracted her to the school.

On her arrival Anderton saw some basic areas that she wanted to improve. These areas included a more professional staff, a stronger commitment to the development of the student, and a new orientation for the health center.

Looking to the future Anderton is hoping that Student Life can move more towards a total intergration of education. "This intergration," explained Anderton, "is comprised of learning in and out of class, more student-faculty relations, and the addressing of issues affecting Whitworth."

### Michael Goins

Mike Goins, Vice President for Business Affairs, coordinated the \$7 million tax exempt bond issue for facility improvements in addition to his other responsibilities during 1987.

Goins is responsible for the budgeting process, accounting and reporting system, purchasing, personnel, administrative support service, financial aide administration, and the physical plant.

"Whitworth has come through some difficult years and has made tremendous strides towards becoming much more sound financially," stated Goins.

### Joseph Black

Joe Black, Vice President of Institutional Advancement, is a man that many students at Whitworth do not know. Even though the students of Whitworth never see Mr. Black in the spotlight, his daily responsibilities are probably what drew many of us to Whitworth.

Remember the Whitworth College advertisement in Campus Life and all the information you received from Admissions?

Mr. Black is the manager of Admissions, Public Relations, and College Development all of which made your interest in Whitworth grow.

As Whitworth approaches 1990, and prepares to celebrate its centennial Mr. Black has been without rest. The program he has designed for the centennial is a three stage process which includes: 1) The revamping of admissions and a new enrollment procedure. 2) A capital campaign for the celebration of 1990. 3) The raising of money for the renovation of the library and the Hardwick Union Building, and a larger endowment fund.

The financial goal of this campaign is \$15 million. Commenting on the total of \$15 million Black said, "that is not a lot in today's standards, but for Whitworth it is."

# Baseball Takes Home a Winning Record



This team is fantastic! These guys hang around together, they enjoy each other's company," revealed coach Scott McQuilkin concerning the baseball team unity.

McQuilkin said that nine seniors showed a great deal of talent and leadership. He expressed a very fine attitude about this season's demonstrated play.







## Men's Tennis

Two returning All-American team members, both academic and athletic All-American qualified for nationals. Gwen Keiser, senior and Arnie Tyler, senior, brought home national rank in '85-'86 and replayed it this year.

Other national qualifiers include Tim Jacobson (junior), Kari Jacobson (junior), Annette Helling (senior), Pete Sutherland, and Barb Lashinske (freshman). Coach Arnie Tyler Sr. also noted outstanding freshmen Jerri Wilkerson, Gary Knolton, Sam Stockton, Kris Young, Jill Gardiner, and Lisa Jenkinson.

Tyler Jr. and Keiser were both athletically inclined as well as talented athletes. Keiser took 5th in national javelin throw in '85-'86 with 148.5 ft. and she graduates with a biology major. Tyler wraps up with a 177.10 ft. in the hammer throw under his belt, which in '85-'86 placed 6th in the nationals. He was accepted into the Nuclear Propulsions Operating Programs and carries a BS in physics and mathematics.

"Gwen was really inspirational. She's so goofy, happy and spirited. She helped me out personally to not let me feel rotten when I was injured," shared freshman Lisa Jenkinson.

Tyler Jr. modestly described his season, "It wasn't that

hot early on, but it climbed back up on the top third to sixth in the nation with a lot of patience."

Tim Jacobson, discus and hammer, placed fourth in the Indoor Nationals. A transfer student this year, he stated, "This was the first year I had really been coached well." He also admitted that at the Indoor Nationals, other athletes in his sport oversized him, but he felt great being there. But don't be fooled that it was just another day for him because he confessed his adrenalin flowed heavily.

Jacobson's wife, Kari, also jumped out on top in the Heptathlon and qualified for nationals with her 100m hurdles in 14.8, 400m hurdles in 63.8, long jump at 17.10 ft, and strong 400m and 600m sprints.

Barb Lashinski ranked nationally as a freshman in the top three javelin throwers. A 160.3ft throw put Lashinskie in the lime light.

The three coaches, Tyler, Hal Werner (distance), and Don Latimer (sprints and relays), agreed that the team unity was like no other they had seen before. "At the Salzman relays when the last race was completed, the runners had to cool down and the whole team joined them and did four laps all together. They did it without being told, but just because they all like each other. They laughed, talked, and had fun," explained Coach Tyler.

Jenkinson divulged the difference she sees from high school track and Whitworth track as a freshman, "Whitworth people care about you. They take the time for you."






# Lights, Camera, Action!





